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OUR FIRST MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

Below is a report of our first missionary conference ever held in the history of our work here in Africa. During the Christmas Quarterly at Altona, we as a missionary group expressed a desire and felt the need of having a time of spiritual fellowship together. Thus we formed the "Reformed Baptist Field Conference," with our Superintendent, Rev. E. A. M. Kierstead as chairman. The first conference was held at the home of Rev. and Mrs. E. A. M. Kierstead in Vrheid, April 2-5. Truly the Lord was with us from the very opening of the first service, on Thursday evening, right through to the closing service on Sunday evening. The Lord met with us each one in a very gracious way and blessed and refreshed our spirits.

I don't believe you friends in the homeland can really realize just how much we needed to get together such as I have mentioned. You are being continually fed in your Prayer Services, Young People's Service, Regular Church Services, Beulah, Quarterly Meetings, etc. We as missionaries very rarely see each other with the exception of Quarterly Meetings. While these Quarterlies are good, yet they are planned especially for the benefit of the native church. I do not mean to limit the power or the grace of God as it is marvellous and truly wonderful how the Lord meets our spiritual needs daily. But, oh, how often we do long for the fellowship of our Christian Church such as we enjoyed in the homeland. We did enjoy a large portion of this fellowship during our short conference last week-end.

We have planned another conference to be held here at Hartland in October of this year. These conferences will be held yearly, but as Easter is not too suitable a time, the date is being changed to October, thus two conferences this year.

Thursday evening Mrs. Eugene Kierstead spoke from II Chron. 20:1-17, emphasizing the great need of much faith and trust in our daily lives. Friday morning began with a prayer service at 7 o'clock led by Miss Nina Smith. At 9 o'clock a meeting for the children was conducted by Mrs. William Morgan. 10.30 preaching service by Rev. Eugene Kierstead. He brought a very effective message, using the outline, "GO-PREACH-TEACH." Then with the first letter of each word erased he emphasized the purpose of this commission: "O! REACH EACH." Friday afternoon Mr. Harold Kierstead spoke on the theme of "Friendship with God," and illustrated by the life of Abraham how this might be accomplished. At the close of the afternoon message, a business session was held. During this business meeting, Miss Mary Campbell gave a very interesting report concerning her activities while on furlough in Canada.

Friday evening at 7 o'clock preaching service by Rev. Charles Sanders. His message was taken from John 17: "The Prayer of Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane." He sopke of Christ's desire to return to be with the Father; His desire for the disciples that they might be unified even as He and the Father are uinfied; His desire for all believers that they might be sanctified and be with Him. Satur-

day morning prayer service at 7 o'clock led by Miss Mary Campbell. At 10:15 Saturday morning, business session, during which reports were heard from each mission station. Saturday afternoon, 2 o'clock business meeting during which our Superintendent, Rev. Kierstead, reported on his field work and placed before us some of the difficulties and challenges that are facing us. Saturday evening at 7 o'clock we had Rev. Bohler, of the Evangelical Teacher Training College, Vryheid, as guest speaker. "Be not carried away with the error of the wicked but grow in grace." II Peter, chap 1, was the theme of his message. He stressed primarily the need of continuous growth in grace. Sunday morning a time of prayer and fasting at 7 o'clock led by Mrs. Charles Sanders. Children's meeting at 9 o'clock by Mrs. William Morgan. Children of missionaries connected with E. T. T. C., also attended the children's meetings. The morning message was brought by Rev. William Morgan. "The Power of the Resurrection," Matt. 28:6 formed the basis of his message. Rev. Charles Sanders brought the Sunday afternoon message from John 19. "Contact with God and its effect on our lives." Sunday evening Rev. Eugene Kierstead brought the closing message, using the theme, "Holiness."

I believe I express the thoughts and feelings of all our missionaries when I say that we all returned to our stations much better equipped and with renewed strength to go out and fight against the armies of Satan that are arrayed against us on every side.

THE TRIP TO A KRAAL

The other morning a woman arrived at our back door wanting medicine for a sick baby. The baby had been ill for three weeks, and from the way the woman talked was really bad. I suppose the native doctors hadn't been able to help, so they came to me as the last resort. I do not give out medicine, unless it is absolutely necessary, unless I can see the patient.

I decided after talking to the woman that I would go to the kraal with her. I had no one to go and interpret for me, but decided to try and do the best I could with what little Zulu I knew and understood. I got some medicine ready, a thermometer and a stethoscope and put them in a purse, and with my walking stick started off with the woman.

We walked about a quarter of a mile along the road, and then took a native path up a hill, over a stonewall at the top and down over the other side of the hill. We walked for about a mile over a fairly level area, which gradually declined to a river. We crossed two dongas which were not very deep, for this I was glad as the sides were almost vertical. (Dongas are clefts in the earth caused by erosion.) The grass was nearly as tall as I was in most places and had to be pushed aside as we walked along the path in single file. We didn't cross the river at this point, but circled around the bend and up another hill. We followed the path through a mealie patch and on down to the river. We crossed the river and started up a steep hill to the kraal. I was glad there was only a short climb.

We got to the kraal and the woman showed me into a hut. I seated myself on a mat on the floor. I was glad for a chance to cool off. I

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
