DO WE BEGIN RIGHT?

The last half of Acts 4 tells of God's working, of great blessing, and of man's successful labours, in the Early Church, such as we need today. The sacred record gives inspired and powerful preaching and witnessing, many new converts, abundant grace upon all, a prevailing spirit of unity, and liberal and overflowing offerings. The secret was twofold. First, there was prayer: "And when they had prayed." Then, the Christians were "all filled with the Holy Ghost." Doubtless the first led to the second, and the two together were the secret of that which followed.

The pattern of the Early Church cannot be improved upon. It shows us God's way, and the only truly successful way. All too often we begin with a preaching campaign, ask the people to pray, and spend most of the effort getting already enlightened believers revived and filled with the Spirit, and close with few if any brand new converts. Of course services and conventions particularly for the enlightenment and sanctifying of Christians are in order, and are necessary; but do we not spend hundreds if not thousands of dollars giving well blessed people the luxury of hearing another preacher, and in seeking to get believers who know well what to do, to the place of obedience, when much of it ought to be spent reaching the lost? Recently I read a report from a pastor in another holiness denomination telling of a season of revival in his church. He says, "Without workers, expense or advertising, God has shown that He is not limited to time, men or talent." He reports that "for about two months without a break, God visited our services with conviction, conversion and consecration. Scores of souls made their way to the altar aud both saint and sinner recognized the wonder working hand of God." Then he gives this explanation and exhortation: "Back of it all was two or three groups of praying people, with a prayer answering God listening. For the encouragement of pastors and church leaders, I want to say that if we get our people praying and keep them at it, the fire will fall." There is no need for me to write more. The way is clear. Let us begin with prayer-prolonged and persistent prayer, prayer until the Holy Ghost comes in sanctifying power. The outcome for us will also be powerful and inspired preaching and witnessing, many new
