We feel as your servants that it is our duty to give you a report from this new vine of the Lord's planting, which he used us to begin in May, 1951, by securing the splendid church we now occupy by agreement with the owners.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the Home Mission Board and others who have helped us as a church during our repair and re-decorating campaign. The Home Mission Board supported the exterior work at an expense of about \$2,000. The interior work was done at a cost of about \$1,000. This was raised by individual donations, the greater part of which I solicited locally.

The exterior of the church was given two coats of white paint and the interior was completely redone. The ceiling and dome was insulated by the men of the church. They have also built two spacious classrooms in the basement which are much needed with our rapidly growing Sunday School.

Since coming to Old Town two years ago, the Lord has blessed abundantly. Our S. S. was organized with 13 members. We recently set a record of 66, with an average of 54 during the past few weeks. Recently seven young people of our congregation have been converted, and, Lord willing, we are looking forward to a baptism in the near future.

The Young People's group is a thriving and spiritual work. They set a new attendance record January 25th, with 27 present. We have also organized a girls' Junior Missionary Society and a Boys' Group. Each meet monthly for devotions and project work.

The work in general is encouraging and all departments of the church are moving forward in the harmony and Spirit of God.

Personally, Mrs. Moses and I wish to thank our many friends for their Christmas greetings and gifts. Our church kindly remembered us with a gift of money. God has been good to us, and we are grateful for the privilege of serving Him.
