Chapman's books is one of many testimonies to the transforming power of the Light of the World: "In 1859 a man could be bought for seven dollars in the Fiji Islands to be butchered and eaten. Today there is a Bible in every home, and on Sunday nine out of ten people assemble for worship." "The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined."
