God Needs Us

THE MINISTRY OF THE HOLY GHOST IN REGENERATION

The Holy Spirit is a divine, invisible person. As a worker, He generally works through the people of God. As a workman, the Word of God is the instrument He uses. His "general" work, one says, is to strive and to convict the sinner (Gen. 6:3; John 16:7, 8) through the Word of God (Rom. 3:19-20; Eph. 6:17). His "special" work is that of regeneration (John 3:5, 8; Titus 3:5). The Word is His instrument (I Peter 1:23; James 1:18). His "abiding" work is that of sealing the saint (Eph. 1:13).

The sinner, dead in trespasses and sins, needs life. Conviction awakens the sinner to his need of spiritual life. As the Executor of the Godhead and Administrator of the Estate of Grace, the Holy Spirit is the sole agent in man's regeneration which is stipulated in Christ's will (or testament) for man. (Eph. 1:7; Col. 1:14). There being no other authorized Executive of the Godhead, only through the Spirit can we receive that which Christ has provided for us.

Regeneration is of spiritual origin. It is that gracious state in which the penitent sinner, who was dead in sins (Eph. 2:1), enters when in response to his faith in Christ the Holy Spirit, as the Spirit of Life (Rom. 8:2), imparts life to the soul and thereby makes one a new creation (II Cor. 5:17; Gal. 6:15). "This implies the forgiveness of sins, the impartation of spiritual life, and the witness of the Spirit to adoption . . . true converts . . . have the joys of pardon, the impulses of a new life, and a sweet assurance of sonship" (Sheridan Baker in Hidden Manna).

The Holy Spirit, in administering the provisions of atonement merit, by the act of regeneration produces holy inclinatins, qualifications and dispositions in the soul. He may use a variety of methods, but there is uniformity in what is wrought in the believer's soul: likeness to God, conformity of the nature to the divine nature, and agreement of the will with the divine will. Thus the regenerated soul possesses both a new life and a new mode of being, "a new bias and predominating impulse." This regeneration reveals how the transformation, which produces the moral characteristics which qualify man to receive the blessings promised in Matt. 5:1-12, is wrought: by the divine Spirit. The fact that there is mystery connected with this, as there is with natural generation, does not disprove its reality, which is demonstrated by its effects, the consciousness of a new life, and the sense of living in a new world.

Let all the faithful prayer-warriors of our Crusade army make special petition to God for revival in every church. people of the world, realize the fact that we need God. But today let us look at the other side. Does God need us? God created men for fellowship and the worship which is His by right of creation; therefore, God needs us as consecrated and obedient Christians in order to carry out His purpose in making the human race.

We might say, God doesn't need me. It won't make any difference to Him. But let us look at ourselves a minute as fathers and mothers. We know that when our children are young they especially need us. If we lose them could we say we did not need them? In a sense we could. We could live and carry on without them, but one of our chief joys in life would be gone, and our plans defeated. It is thus with God when His greatest creation is lost, or we as Christians fail and leave the fold of Christ.

If we know that God needs us it should make us realize our responsibility and give a determination never to fail Him. In any cause, if we felt we were needed, we should, no doubt, give more effective service.

We must also realize how God is depending on us, as members of His Church, to carry out the Great Commission of Mark 16:15. Without our faithfulness, as preachers and disciples, the purpose that God planned, and All that I am I owe to Jesus Christ revealed to me in His Divine Book.—David Livingstone.
