A GREAT CONVERSION

On a day that I can never forget, when I was about fifteen, my dear mother was absent from home. I had a holiday, and in the afternoon looked through my father's library to find some book with which to while away the hours. As nothing attracted me there, I turned to a basket of pamphlets, and selected a Gospel tract that looked interesting, saying to myself, "There will be a story at the beginning, and a sermon or a moral at the close: I will take the former and leave the latter for those who like it." I sat down to read in an utterly unconcerned state of mind, and with an intention to put it aside as soon as it should seem prosy.

Little did I know at the time what was going on in the heart of my dear mother some eighty miles away. She arose from the dinner table that afternoon and with an intense yearning for the conversion of her boy, feeling that a special opportunity for prayer was afforded her. She went to her room, resolved not to leave until her prayer was answered. Hour after hour did she plead until she could plead no longer, but was constrained to praise God for what the Spirit assured her had been accomplished—the conversion of her boy.

While reading the tract I was struck with the sentence, 'The finished work of Christ.' I thought, 'Why does the author use this expression? Why not say the atoning or propitiatory work of Christ?' Immediately the words came to my mind, 'It is finished.' What was finished? I at once replied, 'A full and perfect atonement, and satisfaction for sin; the debt was paid by the Substitute; Christ died for our sins.' Then came the thought, 'If the whole work was finished, and the whole debt paid, what is there left for me to do?' And with it dawned the joyful conviction, as light was flashed into my soul by the Holy Spirit, that there was nothing in the world to be done but to fall on my knees and accept this Saviour and His salvation, and to praise Him for evermore. Thus while my mother was praising God in her chamber, I was praising Him in the old warehouse. -Hudson Taylor.
