NEWS CONCERNING REV. H. S. MULLEN

Dear Highway Friends:

Greetings We would like a little space to report Mr. Mullen's physical condition. A number have sent "Get Well" cards and have said they would like to hear how he is, so I am taking this way to let you know.

Many of you already know that Mr. Mullen has been very low with virus pneumonia for the past three months. Taking his bed the 25th of September he grew worse, and for two weeks or more he seemed to hang between life and death. Finally the change came, when he showed signs of recovery, when our faith was changed into sight.

Christmas Day, which made it just three months, he had recovered sufficiently, though very weak, to dress and join the family for Christmas dinner and receiving of gifts around the tree. A happy day it was; but before giving you the very latest concerning this good man, we will quote a preacher of bygone days, "God hath kindly veiled the future." Isn't it true, and isn't it grand that He has?

Christmas night he was in the throes of a gall-bladder attack, which was followed by two more attacks much worse than the first. At 1.00 p. m. on the last day of 1953 he was rushed to the hospital at Digby, N. S., where he was operated on at 7.00 p. m.

Being so weak from the long sickness and the three attacks he almost passed out during the operation. To use the doctor's own words to Paul, "We thought we had lost him." He was given a blood transfusion, and oxygen was administered for twenty-four hours. So his worst sickness is the last one.

I am glad to report that he is, as far as we can see, doing nicely considering what he has gone through. Please pray for us. Thank the Lord the Great Physician Who held steady the surgeon's hand. To God we give the glory. Amen.
