FROM TRURO, N. S.

Dear Highway Friends:

Seven or eight months have quickly passed since our last report to The Highway. Activities of those months have included two twoweek evangelistic campaigns, a DVBS, a baptism and reception of members, a week-end youth convention, and a five-day missionary conference. As even now we review those activities, gratitude wells up in our hearts for the manifest blessing of God. Each endeavour, as we and the church think, prospered. There were some seekers in all three of the evangelistic efforts, and there were missionary volunteers in the missionary conference. The spiritual tide in recent weeks has been especially high. We are thankful for a sustained interest in revival. A prayer group of five men meets every Tuesday and Thursday morning at 7.30 a. m. The remarkable thing about the October campaign with Brother Ingersoll was that although many under conviction did not yield, the church was not discouraged but expectant even when the meeting closed. We are yet awaiting the full harvest of these efforts.

The missionary conference is a story by itself. In order to give our missionaries due recognition and in order to encourage other churches to greater missionary aspirations, we feel to report the conference separately.

In the last year and a half the Sunday School average attendance has increased from forty-five to above seventy. The DVBS enrollment in July exceeded one hundred with a one-day high of ninety-five.

Since July much-needed building improvements have been made including a new asphalt-shingle roof, an oil heating boiler and burner, and an exterior coat of paint on the church. Most of the painting was done by volunteers. Interior improvements are planned for the winter months.

Lack of space does not allow us to say all that we should about our special labourers: Rev. and Mrs. R. T. Ritchie, accompanied by Miss Molly Allister; Miss Ruth Harding; Lic. and Mrs. Karl Gorman, Rev. Ralph Ingersoll, and our missionary party. We can sincerely say that all rendered good service, which honoured the Lord.

In recent months the Lord has added to our fellowship some fine Christians who are a blessing to us.

We recognize today that although men labour, God gives the increase. To Him be the glory. Yet truly men have laboured. Many of the church people have worked earnestly and unselfishly. They have given generously far beyond their tithes. Consequently, it is quite understandable that God is blessing the work.

We love our people greatly, and we love our Christ supremely. We rejoice in what God is doing here, but also in what God is doing in other places. Our prayer is: A revival for every church.
