wherever the path of duty may lie for me. I do not need a special revelation from the sky at every turn of the corner; I do not need a voice from the clouds saying "This is the way, walk ye in it." God has given to each one of us a sense of duty, a sense of right and of wrong, and if we will but allow the Holy Spirit to guide us in our thinking, and in our living He will so direct our paths that we will be in a real sense of the word, following the Master.

The Master set the example of service. He said, "I came not to be ministered unto, but to minister." He was not wanting somebody to be constantly waiting on Him. He was too busy taking care of the needs of suffering humanity around Him, to be wanting somebody to be ministering to Him. He was not constantly thinking of Number One. He was giving Himself for others. He was not looking for the easiest way out, He was looking for the will of the Father, for to do the will of the Father was meat and drink to Him.

I talked one time, to a young person who was hesitating at the cross-roads. The way of the world with all its allurements lay out ahead. The path that Christ marked out was one of service and involved some self-denial. As the person hesitated wondering which way to take I simply reminded them that if Christ had counted the cost of our redemption, He might have figured it too big a price to pay and we would have been forever lost.

The great promise is, that if any man serve Me, him will My Father honor. I do not know how great will be the extent of that honor. I do not know how vast it will be, I only know that what God does, He does with a lavish hand. When He created worlds, He created millions of them; when He paints the sunset He does it with all the glory imaginable even though its beauty may last but for a fleeting moment. The contemplation of being rewarded for our service to the Master ought to spur us on with all the holy zeal. We ought to labor with a fervency of spirit. We ought to be eager to find opportunities to serve God. Our cry ought to be, "What can I do to serve Him," rather than, "Let somebody else do it, I'm a little busy now."

"Can we, whose souls are lighted With wisdom from on high, Can we to men benighted The lamp of life deny?"

Let our Easter offering be a witness to our desire and determination to give all men at least one honest chance to know Christ as Saviour and Friend. E. W. T.
