THE CHRISTMAS FAITHFUL

When the mystery of God made man in Bethlehem's First Noel, ushered in the era of "Emmanuel,"—"God with us"—few indeed were the faithful whose expectancy was of God for the fulfillment of the prophecies and the deliverance of Israel.

There were astonished shepherds who came with haste to see the thing which the Lord had made known unto them when the Christmas Angel said, "Ye shall find the Babe wrapped in swaddling clothes lying in a manger."

There were kings from the East whose erudition and reverence for creation and the Creator could be challenged by seeing His star in the East and who came to worship Him

There was a Virgin Mary and a Joseph to whom the divine oracles could be revealed.

But in a unique way there were only two in the Christmas story to represent those faithful ones who, without angel visitant or chorus, without mystic stars and celestial guidance, nurtured solely by the revealed prophetic word, sustained by the inner breath of the Spirit, laboring in prayer, in lonely vigils of intercession, provided the faith channel through which God could work to bring to pass His eternal purposes of the Incarnation.

Of Simeon and Anna we know but little. They were neither erudite Magi nor wealth-creating shepherds. They were not of the priestly order to minister in the Temple worship nor yet Levites to serve. Of Simeon it is said that "He was just and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel: and the Holy Ghost was upon him." Of Anna it is said, "She departed not from the temple, but served God with fastings and prayers night and day.

Both of these Spirit-guided ones were lifted up out of the obscurity which commonly shrouds the lives of intercessors. For the most part in the pomp and ceremony of the usual Christmas celebration, such as these are forgotten, but in the first Christmas story they live forever to cheer and encourage those whose labor is prayer and whose sacrifice is intercession.

The rarest and the costliest coin brought as gifts to our Lord at Christmas time is just that —prayer and intercession.

If our Lord should come this Christmas time would He find us offering through prayer and intercession, the faith channel for the accomplishment of His divine purposes? Can we work and walk through the holiday season with uppermost in our lives the one great purpose which brought Christ to earth that First Noel and will yet bring Him back in splendour—that of the redeeming and saving of earth's lost millions?—The Missionary Standard.

Would to God that it would begin here in the homeland ere we go back to the foreign field. Then crossing the great expanse of water, burst into flames on our African field.
