DR. P. WISEMAN'S NEW BOOK

We have been reading with profit Dr. P. Wiseman's latest book "Biblical Perfection." The title of the book suggests its need because, as is stated in the preface: "In the realm of the application of redemption the word perfection has been misunderstood perhaps more than any other word, unless it would be the word holiness."

The author shows that there is a Biblical perfection, and explains what it is not, what it is, what it includes, and how it is experienced. The chapter headings are: Perfection Among Biblical Expressions, Perfection and Imperfections, Perfection that is Biblical, Perfection Obtained, Perfection Inclusive, and Perfection Involves Christlikeness of Character. Throughout the book the subject is dealt with scripturally and clearly, and should be very helpful and instructive to both ministers and laity. Indeed, while the book may be read through, and ought to be, perhaps a number of times, it contains much material for Bible study. We wish for it a wide reading and a gracious ministry.
