"One Clear Call"

How does one know whether he is called to the ministry or missionary activity, or any other distinct type of Christian service? Here are some evidences that will appear in the lives of all who are genuinely called of God to some special line of service in His Kingdom. They may not all exist at the same time but sooner or later will put in their appearance, and may be used as means for test or reassurance.

- 1. First of all, and most important, is a direct, clear, definite, personal leading straight from God. An inner knowledge as plain and unmistakeable as the witness to salvation, or the knowledge of personal identity. You need this. Without it, you will meet things while in service that will utterly defeat you. It may come at the first, like a flash, or it may come later, after a period of growing toward it; but my opinion is that you had better not consider seriously any special type of Christian service without it. If you are not certain yet, or the call has become confused in your mind, the following may help you find your way.
- 2. An abiding conviction that "this is the way for me". Satan may counterfeit the "flash" or the "revelation," but his false "call" will not remain as a steady, quiet, abiding conviction. It will make you feel queer and out of place, and you'll have to fight to keep yourself believing it. God's call remains and increases.
- 3. An increasing clearness as to what the call is and means—its content and limitations. Remember the ministry is a field, not a job.
- 4. There will be willingness to wait on the Lord. A false call allows you no time to wait or think or test or prepare.
- 5. Generally the Church (the genuinely spiritual people) will sense and approve and make room for the person's call. Notice that I said 'generally." People may ask you about your call before God does.
- 6. A great sense of insufficiency and personal weakness. "Without me ye can do nothing."
- 7. The call will almost certainly be in line with your natural abilities, gifts, and limitations. Remember God may be aware of some aptitudes that you do not know you possess.
- 8. There will be divine assistance in doing the thing you're called to do. A measure of success. You'll be aware that "God is helping me do this."
- 9. A lift of spirit (in spite of your feeling of weakness) and encouragement from the Lord whenever you think and pray in harmony with that call. An inner approval and sanction.
- 10. Providential openings for the use and exercise of that call—sometimes before you feel ready, or when you'd rather they didn't come
- 11. The Providential supply of your needs along this line, as regards both service in that calling, and preparation and training for that place of service.

Whatever happens, be neither impatient nor despondent—wait, pray, keep alert, do the next thing. Remember "He maketh a way when there is no way," and "he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have light enough to live by." Say "Thy will be

THE INADEQUATE PASTOR

A pastor could spend twelve hours a day, seven days a week calling on the lost and the unchurched. Or, he could spend those hours calling in the home of the members, sick and inactive.

So, a pastor—any pastor—must forever remain inadequate. He can attempt to cover five fields of endeavor in part, devoting about twenty per cent of his time to each, leaving each job eighty per cent undone! Hence, the term "inadequate pastor."

Inadequate, desperately busy, always behind with his work, the preacher thinks his job is the best on earth. Pray for him and bear with him; he is the only member of the church who has no pastor.—Grace Broadcaster.
