RIGHTEOUSNESS EXALTETH . . .

Let us take a look at influence of wickedness on the one hand, and that of godliness on the other, as regards motherhood and offspring:

Let us consider two families: the Jonathan Edwards family, and the Jukes family.

The Edwards family lived in New England. Mrs. Edwards was a saintly woman, and a great mother. In the offspring and record of that family we find the following: 13 became presidents of universities; 65, college professors; 60, doctors; 100, lawyers; 100, preachers; 60, authors; 30, judges. Others became senators, mayors, and public servants.

The Jukes family, also, lived in New York; of their descendants, we have the following: 300 died prematurely; 200 were thieves and murderers; 300 were executed; 90 were prostitutes; 145 were drunkards; 200 victims of social disease. The crimes of that family cost the State of New York more than \$1,000,000!
