The prospect of furlough brings mixed feelings to the missionary. There is the anticipation of seeing the friends left in the homeland and being refreshed by fellowship with them. way of May 31 tells of more thousands of But there are also feelings of sorrow at leaving many Christian friends in Africa, both among the white and the black people. It was hard to part with the little band of faithful missionaries, and the larger band of native Christian workers. It is hard to leave a work that is faced with a large opportunity, and struggling to find the right solution to many problems. A work that needs more prayer, more manpower, and more ways and means. However, we are glad to know that God's will is best, both for us, and for His work. And we feel that it is God's will for us to leave them and come home to you at this time. We pray that we may keep in His will.

It was a busy time for us preparing to leave Africa. There were special trips, and special meetings, besides the regular services. Then there was the packing to do and the many farewells to be said. Those last few months are packed with interesting and treasured memories.

Our Superintendent, with the mission pickup, and the Morgans, with their small Austin truck took us from Vryheid to Durban; and the Morgans were able to be with us a few days before we embarked for Canada.

We are now in England after 19 days of sea travel with only three stops: Cape Town, Woluis Bay, and Las Palmas on the Canary Islands. On a whole it has been a nice voyage so far. We greatly enjoyed the Christian fellowship, as we gathered every morning in the ship's theatre for morning devotions. We docked at Southampton, then came up to London by train. Our next boat leaves on June 9 so we have a few days to see a few of the many places of interest in this old and famous city.

We appreciate the prayers of God's people as we journey homeward. We are glad too for your prayers for Myra's mother in her illness at this time.

The Lord willing we shall be seeing you at Beulah and probably at Riverside too.

May God bless our work in Africa and also in the homeland.

"Faith is not for firesides, but for battlefronts—for road builders and chasm spanners."

"The crying need of the hour is fourfold: (a) recapture the field; (b) rediscover the simplicity of the Gospel; (c) restore the richness of true Christian fellowship; and (d) regain the vision of a lost world."

"The teachings of Christ can be summed up mainly in three areas: (a) a holy life; (b) full and loyal obedience; and (c) utter self-forgetfulness. This is the most effective method of teaching, for those who are leaders."

"Even in the holiness movement we have preachers who preach essential doctrine but who have no personal experience of the sanctifying and abiding presence of the Holy Spirit. The result is that the doctrine loses its charm and attractiveness."-Exchange.
