We feel that a brief report is due from our church here.

This being our first regular pastorate, and consequently our first letter to The Highway, we hardly know how to put our feelings into words.

However, since coming to this church officially on Sunday, July 18th, we have enjoyed working with the people of the church and community.

Soon after our arrival, a large number of friends gathered at the temporary parsonage for a social evening. Deacon Norman Churchill, on behalf of those present, presented us with a sum of money.

In co-operation with Lic. Murray Shaw and the United Baptist Church, a community D. V. B. S. was held from July 21st to 30th. Volunteer workers were Lic. Murray Shaw, Miss Elizabeth Trask, Miss Floris Landers, Miss Loma Shaw, Miss Anne Brittain, Mrs. Edgar Landers, Mrs. Gorman and myself. Classes were held in the local school house. We appreciated the loan of an organ by Mrs. Robert Landers, and the use of their cars by Mr. A. M. Shaw and Mr. Robert Landers for conveying children to and from the school. Evening classes were conducted in the parsonage for those over 13 years of age. In spite of an epidemic of mumps there were over 100 enrolled, and an average attendance of 76. The church was full to capacity for the closing program. vd dailleds and bumor bus boron

The people have undertaken to build a permanent parsonage opposite the church, and have pledged \$3,000.00 toward it this church year.

We have a busy schedule drawn up for the balance of the church year. Included are, several Missionary Sundays this fall, an Evangelistic Campaign in January, and the Denominational Young People's Rally in the Spring.

We would like to say a word of commendation for the excellent work of the former pastor and his wife, Rev. and Mrs. H. S. Wilson, The excellent spiritual condition of the church, and the high esteem of the entire community are testimonies to their labor here.

We count it a privilege to be laborers together with God in this part of His vineyard.
