"YOU HAVE OVERCOME"

Temptation is certainly manifold, that is, various in kind and quality, numerous, many-sided. Peter wrote to the Christians of his day: "You are in heaviness through manifold temptations." (1 Peter 1:6). The Devil, like Heinz, has many varieties. But God has a manifold grace which is as varied as temptation itself. (1 Peter 4:10). It is grace for every type of temptation. The Wicked One has no secret temptations as far as God is concerned. The Devil has not yet developed — nor never will develop — a weapon for which God does not have an adequate defense, and even a counter-attack. "Thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ."

Thus John could write to the young men: "You have overcome the wicked one." (1 John 2:13).

I can imagine that those young men were much like young men today. Within their group one would find represented the varied types he would find today.

There was the young man who was naturally given to worldliness. He used to like to go to the amphitheater to see the wordly amusements. To him John said: "You have overcome the wicked one."

There was the young man who had had time for only sports. But then he had become a Christian and realized that "bodily exercise profiteth little." (1 Timothy 4:8). He could not pursue sports as ardently as before. His major interest through Christ had become a minor interest. To him John said: "You have overcome the wicked one."

There was the young man who, naturally, would have lived for the lusts of the flesh, satisfying himself and corrupting his character. But having found a new life in Christ, he learned that fleshly lusts war against the soul. Through the Spirit he had mortified the deeds of the body. (Romans 8:13). John must have been proud of him when he wrote: "You have overcome the wicked one."

Young people, you can all be overcomers. You need not be overcome. God has grace for your particular temptation — remember? manifold grace. "Be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart." C.E.S.
