OBITUARY

Rev. H. S. Wilson died suddenly at the Reformed Baptist parsonage, Barker's Point, N. B., Dec. 8th., following a heart seizure. He was sixty-three years of age.

Harry Shepherd Wilson was born at Seal Cove, Grand Manan, N. B., son of the late Loren and Lena Wilson. He served overseas with the Canadian Army during the 1914-18 World War, was seriously wounded in action and hospitalized for several months. After returning to this country, he was remarkably converted and later called to preach the Gospel. He was ordained to the ministry of the Reformed Baptist Alliance in July 1934 and served pastorates at Jonesport, Calais, Crawford, Maine, Sandford-Port Maitland-Brazil, N. S., Black's Harbour and Barker's Point, N. B. He was highly esteemed by ministers and lay people alike and enjoyed good success in pastoral and evangelistic ministry.

In Sept., 1954, Brother Wilson suffered severe attacks of coronary thrombosis, but after several weeks of rest made good recovery and returned to his duties just a year before his death. He has been carrying a full schedule of pastoral responsibilities, but was forced to stop preaching Sunday evening, Dec. 4th. Stricken with what proved to be a fatal attack about 3.00 p.m. Dec. 8th., he lived less than an hour. Up to the last, "he was strong in faith, giving glory to God."

Immediate relatives of the deceased are the widow, the former Gertrude Cochrane, one son, Harry, age 10, one daughter, Mrs. Wilbur Clark, of Sandford, Maine, two brothers and five sisters.

The funeral was held from the Reformed Baptist Church, Barker's Point, which Bro. Wilson pastored from July, 1954, and was conducted by the Alliance Superintendent, Rev. N. E. Trafton, assisted by Revs. F. A. Watson, G. R. Symonds, H. R. Ingersoll, and Lic. Jacks Stevens. Favourite hymns were sung by the Barker's Point Trio. Revs. F. A. Dunlop, J. A. Owens, R. H. Nicholson, W. E. Greene, S. R. Ingersoll, and M. W. Bagley acted as pall bearers. There were twenty-five ministers present at the service. Brother Trafton paid high tribute to the deceased in his message based on Rev. 12:11. Interment was in the United Baptist Cemetery, Marysville.
