The more I examined the Scripture the more convinced I was that without holiness there could be no heaven. Many were the hard struggles which I had with unbelief, and Satan told me that if I ever should get it I should never be able to retain it; but keeping close to the Word of God, with earnest prayer and supplication, the Lord gave me to see that nothing short of it would do in a dying hour and the judgment-day. Seeing this, it was my constant cry to God that He would cleanse my heart from all sin, and make me holy, for the sake of Jesus Christ. I well remember returning one night from a meeting with my mind greatly distressed from want of the blessing; I turned into a lonely barn to wrestle with God in secret prayer. While kneeling on the threshing-floor, agonizing for the great salvation, this promise was applied to my mind: "Thou art all fair, my love; there is no spot in thee." But like poor Thomas I was afraid to believe, lest I should deceive myself. O what a dreadful enemy unbelief is! Thomas was under this wretched influence only eight days before Jesus appeared to him; but I was a fortnight after this groaning for deliverance, and saying, "O wretched man that I am, who shall deliver me from the body of this death?" I yielded to unbelief, instead of looking to Jesus and believing on Him for the blessing, not having then clearly discovered that the witness of the Spirit is God's gift, not my act, but given to all who exercise faith in Jesus and in the promise made through Him. At length, one evening, while engaged in prayer meeting, the great deliverance came. I began to exercise faith by believing "I shall have this blessing now." Just at that moment a heavenly influence filled the room; and no sooner had I uttered or spoken the words in my heart, "I shall have the blessing now," then refining fire went "through my heart, illumined my soul, scattered its life through every part, and sanctified the whole." I then received the full witness of the Spirit that the blood of Christ had cleansed me from all sin. I cried out, "This is what I wanted! I have now a new heart." I was emptied of self and sin, and filled with God. I felt I was nothing, and Christ was all in all. Him I now cheerfully received in all His offices: my Prophet to teach me, my Priest to atone for me, my King to reign over me. O what boundless, boundless happiness there is in Christ, and all for such a poor sinner as I am. This happy change took place in my soul

The Spirit baptism will not make all believers evangelists; but it would make all influential witnesses for Christ in the field where God has called each to live and work. It would anoint the mother with power to train her family for the service of God. It would anoint the Sunday-school teacher with power to lead the class to love Jesus. It would enable the Sunday-school superintendent to be a mighty man of God in the Sunday school. The Church universal, baptized with the Spirit, would be resistless in its influence, and terrible in the march of conquest."

Whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, said Jesus Christ, go with him twain (Matt. 5:41).

Everything about Jesus may be said to be an extra. He emptied himself. He stooped to the manger, came to a life of poverty, on to the cross of shame, and to death. He did it all for the human race, that we might not perish but have everlasting life. "He became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich." His birth, His life, His service, His death, yes, and His resurrection, are extras.

Our Lord used a common practice of His day to press home a great principle. The practice among the Romans, that of the government, if in need, compelled man or beast or both to go a legal mile. Our Lord would have His followers to exceed legalism, to catch the great spirit and principle of Christianity, and go the extra mile; the extra in Christian principle, the extra in Christian experience, the extra in Christian service and sacrifice, the extra in faith, the extra in vision!

What need there is today for the Christian extra! While conducting services among the soldiers in Egypt, Dr. Stuart Holden asked a big sergeant in the Highland regiment, a soldier with a bright testimony for the Lord, how he was led to Christ. Here is his answer: "There is a private in the same company who was converted in Malta before the regiment came to Egypt. We gave that fellow an awful time. One night, a terribly wet night, he came in very tired and very wet, and before getting into bed he got down to pray. My boots were heavy with rain and mud, and I let him have one on one side of the head and the other on the other side; and he just went on with his prayers. Next morning I found those boots beautifully polished and standing by the side of my bed. That was his reply to me, and it just broke my heart: I was saved that day."

How much like the spirit of Jesus, and what a good illustration of the extra He would have us go!
