The Lord's Supper

Following our proposed outline: Commemoration, Communion, and Covenant, and having written on the first two we shall now think of the Lord's Supper in the nature of a Covenant.

The words of Jesus, "This cup is the New Testament in My blood" suggests the thought.

The atonement of Christ established so much that is new in the Divine Mind and Plan. This newness, Jesus laboured to impress upon the Jewish mind. He spoke of the necessity of "new wine" being put in "new bottles." In His message referred to as, "The Sermon on the Mount," Jesus repeatedly said, "It has been said, "but I say unto you." To the woman at the well, He said, "The hour cometh and now is, when ye shall neither at Jerusalem nor in this mountain worship the Father." These words of Christ speak unmistakably of something new pending in the Divine economy, and the disposition of the scribes and elders to hold to the old order had much to do with their rejection of their Messiah.

I am truly aware that the subject at hand can only be considered in the most superficial manner in the space I have to give to it, but when we sit at the Lord's Table may we see with grateful praise, the advantages that are ours over the best that the old order could afford.

First, the New Covenant offers to us a better Priest. Here, the Hebrew epistle comes to our aid. "And they truly were many priests, because they were not suffered to continue by reason of death. But this Man, because He continueth ever, hath an unchangeable priest-hood." Hebrews 7:23-24. (Read to end of chapter).

Second, we have a better Pardon. "Whereof the Holy Ghost also is a witness to us; for after that He had said before, this is the Covenant that I will make with them after those days, saith the Lord, I will put My laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I write them, and their sins and iniquities will I remember no more." Hebrews 10:15-17. This, over against the statement: "For the law having a shadow of good things to come, and not the very image of the things, can never with those sacrifices which they offered year by year continually make the comers thereunto perfect. For then would they not have ceased to be offered? because the worshippers once purged would have no more conscience of sins. But in those sacrifices there is a remembrance again made of sins every year. For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins." Hebrews 10:1-4.

Third, we have better Privileges. Under the Old Covenant privileges were greatly restricted. The Holiest Place was shut off from the people by the "veil." Even the high priest could enter but once yearly. We have the assurance that when Christ offered Himself on the Cross the "veil of the Temple was rent from the top to the bottom," Christ, on the basis of His perfect sacrifice, "sat down on the right hand of God," and we are invited to enter into the holiest by the blood of Christ, "by a new and living way which He has consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say His flesh; and having a high priest over the house of God, let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith." Hebrews 10: 19-22.

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
