Alliance Action

At the Alliance Sessions of this year many important items of business were cared for...

Rev. Norman E. Trafton, Alliance Superintendent, presided over the Sessions with grace and efficiency. The confidence of the members of the Alliance was expressed toward Brother Trafton in re-electing him to the superintendency on the first ballot.

By action taken this year, election of the Alliance Superintendent will be bi-annual.

The Mission Boards, Home and Foreign, were elected for three-year terms, and according to the rule made this year this will be the practise in the future.

A resolution passed this year calls for three representatives of the laity on the Bethany Bible College Board, Albert McGeorge, of Halifax, N. S., Norman Churchill, of Sandford, N. S., and Stora Emmett, of Old Town, Maine, were the laymen appointed for a three-year period.

A resolution suggesting the name of our denomination be changed, was referred to the churches, with the request that the proposal be considered by pastors and people "carefully and prayerfully" and that the opinion of the churches be expressed by vote taken at meetings held during the church year 1955-56, such meetings to be presided over by the Superintendent. Further or Final consideration will be given the proposal at next year's Alliance.

Granted ordination by the Alliance this year were Karl Gorman, pastor, Sandford, N. S., Laurence Corey, pastor, Londonderry, N. S., and Kenneth Jewett, pastor, Meductic. Brothers Gorman and Corey were ordained at Beulah, Brother Jewett will be ordained at Meductic Aug. 11th.

Granted license to preach were Jack Stevens, pastoring at Norton, N. B., Jack MacKenzie, evangelist, Hartland, N. B., Gerald MacKinnon, of Halifax, N. S., Stillman Cameron, Black's Harbour, N. B., senior student at Bethany, and Hazen Ricker, Presque Isle, Maine, senior student at Bethany.

The business of the Alliance was conducted in an atmosphere of harmony, tolerance, and understanding befitting an assembly of Christian people. The Lord be praised!
