We had a very good Christmas Conference in our new church in Paulpietersburg. A new church was built here in the last few months. Mr. K. had tried for years to get a site here but had failed. We do thank God that a site was at last obtained. The people here had worshipped in a small 10 x 10 building on the preacher's lot. The Sunday School here had increased and there was not enough room. There is a preacher's lot to the church and a house will be built on this.

The young people's services were well attended. Two girls who are in training as nurses were home on holidays and were able to be there. They all reported that the services were best ever. We do thank God that our youth are taking an interest.

The regular services were also well attended. The Baptism was held on Saturday with twelve being baptized and immediately after the Baptism the service was held. There were thirteen given the right hand of fellowship. We pray that these will remain true.

On Sunday the dedication service was held. The church was packed to the door with people standing. The preaching service was held outdoors I expect there was around 400 or 500 people in attendance. It cost around \$1,000 to build and the debt was paid of except for a few dollars. This church was mostly paid for by the people of our Halifax Church. Thus another Lighthouse has been built in a needy area. This was our fourth church to be dedicated in a year.

The church at Ermelo is nearly ready and will be dedicated later in the year.

The Bible School will open in February with special services. The church there will be dedicated at Easter time. We thank God for this new project, for it is needed if our work is to go forward. Our workers and prospective workers need training if they are going to be the very best for their people.

The medical work has increased in this past week after being at a low ebb for a month or so before Christmas. The natives, too, have been busy in the fields ploughing and hoeing.

We had a very good D.V.B.S. here at Altona just before Christmas. The average attendance was around 15, but we felt that the time was profitably spent. God's Spirit was with us and there was conviction on the services. Several children seemed to have prayed through. It is so difficult for these people to step out by faith and accept the promises of God. They need your prayers.
