THE GREATEST FIELD; THE EASIEST PLOUGHING THE LARGEST YIELD— CHILDREN'S WORK.

The greatest field for gospel work and evangelism is among our children. Most of our churches have more children under their influence than adults. That truth is indicated by the fact that our Sunday schools are commonly larger than our church congregations. We have the privilege of ministering to children whose parents do not even attend our churches. Here among our children is our greatest field. Why should it go unseeded and uncultivated. Why do we spend most of our energies on the adult crop?

We also observe that the ploughing is easier in this field of labour. Children are more tender, pliable, responsive, and sincere. They are more easily won. Even though children are subject to fickleness, their first experience in Christ seems to impress itself indelibly upon their minds and has an inescapable influence in their later lives. Children still have a higher batting average than older folks. A writer in "Herald of His Coming" informs us that 60% of all Christians are saved before they are thirteen years of age.

Child evangelism and training assure the largest yield of all the forms of Christian labour. There is a greater yield in service; a longer life and a better-prepared life for the Master. There is a greater yield in character: a better and earlier foundation, not weakened by years of sin.

Let us turn our eyes to this neglected field and put our hand to the plough.
