EDITORIAL

SOWING AND REAPING

"He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully." The plain teaching of that statement, in 2 Cor. 9:6, is that the measure of our reaping will be according to the measure of our sowing. For a bountiful harvest there must be bountiful sowing. An abundant harvest cannot be gathered from meagre sowing. Sowing sparingly means reaping sparingly.

From the context of this statement we understand that the Apostle was thinking particularly of the giving of our means to God, and let it be considered well in that light. We cannot reap an abundance of spiritual blessing ourselves, or a bountiful harvest in God's work, if we sow sparingly in the matter of our giving to Him. For an abundant harvest in both realms there must be liberal and joyful giving.

But the same principle applies to the giving of our time, our strength, our talents, or whatever else may be included in a complete and practical consecration to God. The sowing includes anything and everything, acceptable to God, that we can do to help make possible a harvest of blessing for ourselves and for others.

Are you conscious of a lack of blessing upon your own soul, and in your own life? If so, it would indicate that you have been sowing sparingly. Have you been complaining of barren altars and of little reaping in your church? "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly." The extent of our reaping is determined by the amount of our sowing. Have you been sowing bountifully? "He which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully."

Then, are you satisfied with another year's labour throughout the Denomination, at home and abroad? Doubtless some of us are not. But have we sowed bountifully in tithes and offerings, and in prayer and sacrificial labours?

In conclusion, let us repeat Paul's statement, and let it be given serious consideration as we think of the summer camp meetings and other special efforts: "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully." Rich harvests are possible. The secret is bountiful sowing on the part of us all. Then let us sow liberally, abundantly, by our prayers, our gifts, our altar work, and the full use of all our beings ransomed powers.

10. Love him and show it. It will cause him to work harder and accomplish more because he knows his work is appreciated.
