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I felt very strongly that our task was not completed, and that we should get into the area under consideration and actually see some of the people.

Today, after viewing the wonderful Victoria Falls, and having procured a guide, we went into the south of Livingstone area (Victoria Falls area).

Our first service was at a railway camp where natives from Portuguese territory live. They gave us a warm welcome and wanted to know if we would be back every Sunday.

Then we went to a place 20 miles from the Falls, and had a service among natives recently moved in from near Bulawayo.

A large number came, listened with earnest attention and after the service many of the men wanted to know if we would be back.

They are very concerned about their children, who have no promise of school. They said we would soon have a following if we would work among them. The proof of the pudding is the eating! The taste we had of work among these displaced Zulu speaking people was a real eye opener!

There they are and more following and to follow! As they themselves said, without a spiritual leader—actually asking us to go and help them.

I wished Mary could have been there to give the children one of her thrilling lessons. My attempt was poor in comparison! Harold spoke on the rich young ruler, while Eric, for whom I interpreted, gave another short good message and my follow-up ended a time of real blessing. We all were convinced that a real opening existed which should be taken up now. Right away! It offers a great advantage over usual work—the fact that they have been displaced has been thrown an unusual door wide open!

Oh! May the Lord of the harvest enable us to step in before the Roman Catholics, who are very active.

It is late but I guess my heart is "burning within me"—isn't there something more I can do to get the wheels turning?

At our recent Conference we did so appreciate the letter from the Mission Board, perhaps especially the reference to work in Rhodesia — showing their keen interest. I wish I knew all the members personally. I guess Mary was right when urging me to apply to be taken back on their field staff, when she said they were wide-awake and a fine lot of men!

Well, dear friends, I must close. May the Good Lord use this in some way. We are sincerely praying for His guidance.
