PRAY TILL THE VICTORY COMES!

There is no discharge in this holy war, and we must continue to press for revival in our Christian communities and evangelism among the unchurched. The natural, human tendency is to let up in our spiritual exercise and efforts for the Lord when it seems that victory is long in coming. But does not the Word of God encourage us to hold on and believe for deliverance when everything continues to look unfavorable? Did not Jesus say, "Men ought always to pray and not to faint," (Luke 18:1)? And is not the accompanying parable of the widow and the unjust judge given to teach that God will avenge His own elect which cry unto Him day and night (I.k. 18:7), though He bear long with them?

Finney described the prayer ministry of the Christians in his day of revival in the following words:

"Not only were prayer meetings greatly multiplied and fully attended, not only was there great solemnity in those meetings, but there was a mighty spirit of secret prayer. Christians prayed a great deal. Many of them would spend hours in private prayer. It was also the case of two or more who would take the promise, 'If two of you shall agree on earth as touching any thing that they shall ask, it shall be done them of my Father which is in heaven,' (Matt. 18:19) and make some particular person a subject of prayer. And it was wonderful to what extent they prevailed. Answers to prayer were so manifestly multiplied on every side, that no one could escape the conviction that God was daily and hourly answering prayer."

If revival has come to your church and community, praise God for it, and press on to see its influence widened. If you have not yet seen the answer to your prayer, pray on, work on in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Fight off the things that would oppress you and keep you from prayer the cares of daily life, weariness, discouragement, and all the foes that come against you. Victory, victory, victory! Pray for it! Believe for it! Expect it! Plan for it! Work for it, and the God of battles will give deliverance.

There are many special meetings that have a measure of blessing in them, but which fall short of real revival. It is a mistake to settle back in the old spiritual ruts, and let things drift. Press on and believe for revival. Perhaps one of these days some of the churches will get beyond this ten-day business and settle down to see things come to pass for God. Insofar as we have been able to discover, the Holy Ghost does not work by the clock nor by the calendar; and we will do well not to try to set time limits for His operations:

We find evidences of a quickened prayer life among the spiritual people, but it is only the beginning of that which is needed. If the prayer of one righteous man availeth much (James 5:16), what of the united petitions of ten such men? Of 100? Of 10,000?

The enemy would like to make us believe that prayer for revival is of no avail in these times; but we still have the Word of God: "This is the confidence that we have in him, that, if we ask anything according to his will, he heareth us: and if we know that he hear us, whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of him," (I John 5:14, 15).—Sel.
