EDITORIALS

BEULAH '56--A GREAT CAMP MEETING

In the good providence of God Beulah Camp Meeting of 1956 was held according to schedule, beginning Friday evening, July 6th. and continuing for ten days over Sunday, July 15th. It was considered by many to be one of the greatest Camps in the long history of Beulah.

Throngs of people from various sections of Canada and the United States filled cottages, dormitories, and the large hotel to overflowing, and many sought accommodations in tourist homes and cabins along the Saint John River. Rev. C. E. Stairs, Alliance President, guided the programme of the Camp efficiently and presided over the meetings in gracious manner and spirit. His call to prayer for denominational revival, sounded first in the devotional service preceding opening of Alliance business sessions, and repeated again and again during the Camp period, found response in many hearts. We believe that we were moved much closer to that goal through the ministry of the spirit at Beulah,

The closing scenes of this year's Camp Meeting were wonderful indeed. From the capacity congregation filling the Tabernacle came scores of people in response to the Gospel invitation. After prayer there was praise, singing, etc., a typical "last night" Beulah scene. Then, with the hands of the Tabernacle clock creeping toward the midnight hour, more than three hundred joined hands in circle to sing "Blest Be the Tie", come under the benediction of the closing prayer by Mrs. H. C. Sanders, and bid farewell while singing "God Be With You Till We Meet Again". It was a wonderful climax to a wonderful Camp. And we left the hilltop of blessing to descend to the valley of need, praying for a great year in the Lord's service and the "meet again" prospect of Beulah Camp of 1957;

REPORT ON MORAL AND SOCIAL REFORM

In the report of the New Brunswick Safety League for the year 1954, it was stated that "the highway fatality rate per road mile was greater in N B. than any other province in Canada or any state in U. S. A."

Reports and statistics are rather cold things if they do not relate to ourselves.. We here at Beulah Camp do not have a personal problem with alcohol or tobacco. This does not mean, however, that alcohol is no problem to us. It is "enemy No. 1" in most every community. The province of Ontario has established, by careful statistics, that liquor is involved in 55% of all highway accidents. Perhaps few here have suffered directly or indirectly from this public enemy. If not, then let us thank God and pray for others who have. If we fail to pray and fail to help overcome this enemy, then we may be sure we have judgment com-

Lives that were taken last year were not ours, but they were people for whom Christ died. The question arises, "what have I done?" enemy of mankind?" Self defence is not enough. There is need of a studied, organized effort to eradicate this evil. We recognize our weakness. We appeal to God and to our people to help before it is too late.

Moral reform is not enough. The message of the gospel alone is sufficient, if taken in love and compassion to the people. To take this message is our need. Are we afraid? If so, then an appeal to all Reformed Baptists for more vital godliness is in order. This can be achieved by giving attention to some negatives and positives. We must ever be on our guard against the improper use of our cars, radio and T. V. sets. We must avoid worldly adornment, worldly conversation, standards and motives. Materialism has engulfed our continent and the church is not excluded. We clamor for larger salaries, better cars and better dwellings with more elaborate furnishings. Materialistic ambitions must be sup-

Let us point out some positives that invariably produce more vital godliness in our lives. our homes, church and nation.

1. Building up our Sunday School and church attendance. The educational program of our Sunday Schools and churches need strengthening. We need a rediscovery of Jesus in our teaching ministry. To know the Master's touch and be able to transmit it to others is the priceless privilege of life. Let us take advantage of our Sunday School. In it we can evangelize and educate the people in the Christ way of life.

2. A strong family altar is one of the greatest evangelistic methods we know. Sunday evening services and revival efforts are not a suitable substitute. To speak of moral reform and neglect the family altar is a contradiction. If we asked today for a show of hands from those with family altars, how many hands would we see? Would you be embarrassed?

3. Good Christian literature should be found in every Reformed Baptist home. Let us not be guilty of forbidding our children to read the trash provided for them today and fail to place in their hands Christian literature geared to their age level.

4. In the rush of daily activities let us give attention to the cultivation of godliness by (Cont'd on Page 7)
