WORLD EVANGELIZATION THE PRIMARY OBLIGATION OF THE CHURCH

Anything less than a world vision and a universal redemption would have been unworthy of God. His love was world-wide. His great gift was for whosoever. His Son followed this pattern. When he sent his disciples to preach, it was to all the world. When he prayed his high-priestly prayer, in John 17, it was for the world. When he died, it was for the world.

How localized and provincial we are in our vision. It is our family we want saved, our church we want built up, our community we want to hear the gospel, our nation we want evangelized. What about the world—over half of whom never have heard his name? What about the more than one and one-half billion who never sat under an evangelistic message? What about the more than a thousand tribes who never have seen a Bible, never heard a prayer offered to God, never heard a gospel song, yea, never heard of Jesus Christ?

You may say, "I am not responsible." What about the Great Commission? What about God's thought of missions? He had only one Son, but he sent him as a missionary. He sent his greatest apostle as a missionary to the outcast. His only book is filled with the thought of missions. I might settle in my comfort and close my eyes to the world's need of him. But what will I do with Ezekiel 3 when I meet it and them at his judgment bar?

I ask, What right has any one of us to hear the gospel twice while four thousand go to hell every hour never having heard it once? We get blessed over the thought of Christ's second coming. But what about the millions who mever have heard of his first coming? How can we be indifferent to the call for help and complacently say and feel that we have too much to do at home? With all the radios, churches, missions, tabernacles, religious presses, preachers, and Christians, all have an opportunity to hear, if they will. But what about the 1700 tribes who speak dialects in which no Bible or religious tract ever has been written, or the name of Christ ever been heralded? They are just as much your responsibility and mine as is America.

Jesus said, "The field is the world." He commanded, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." What does "all the world" mean? What does "every creature" mean? Does it mean just to go as far as I can without its costing me any of my prestige, my place in the church, or my creature comforts, or my church its place in the orbit of denomina. tions? No; he said "Go." Did he command more than he expects or will demand of us when he returns? Do you think he is pleased with our eating the loaves of gospel bread in America while the multitudes in other lands die for a few crumbs? We condemn the rich man for letting Lazarus die of hunger, crying for the crumbs from his table while he fared sumptuously every day. But what about the heathen dying at your gate, begging for a few crumbs of gospel bread while you are overfed on it?

Business would die if it confined itself to America alone; and so will the church. Judson

realized that fact in his day, so he left America for Burma while millions were yet unsaved in America. Livingstone realized it and left England for Africa while millions in England still were unsaved. Paul realized it in his day. He left Palestine and Asia Minor for Europe while thousands were still unsaved in those

If we confine our efforts to the "homeland" to such an extent that men and money are diverted from the great cause of world evangelism, we will soon be on our way to our own graveyard, to be entombed as fossils in lifeless programmes.

STIMULATE THE MISSIONARY SPIRIT

A missionary church is a live church. A missionary church is a growing church. To encourage development of the missionary spirit, we would offer the following sugges-

- (1) Designate the day on which the monthly meeting is held as a day of prayer for missionaries and missionary work.
- (2) Set a definite pattern for regular mis- Master. sionary giving. A tithe of the tithe has been suggested as a minimum. Ask each member to take ten per cent of the month's tithes and set it aside for the missionary meeting.
- (3) Acquaint the people with the area and peoples where our missionary work is located. Ask every member to memorize the names of missionaries. Supply information regarding medical work, schools, etc. Obtain information on the number of churches, new buildings to be erected, etc.
- (4) Have missionary speakers two or three times a year. Missionary conventions are a great stimulus to missionary interest.
- (5) Use missionary films. "The King's Man," a story of the conversion of a Zulu chieftain's son, "Angel in Ebony," the life of Sammy Morris, and others, make tremendous
- (6) Sponsor special projects on the field. A Bible School student can be supported for only \$40.00 per year. \$100.00 will support a native worker. A new church can be built for from \$500 to \$1,000, according to the size of the building, materials used, etc. Don't take the money required for budgets to sponsor special projects, this is needed to meet current expenses, but take a special project on as an "extra." It is a great stimulus to missionary interest for the people to feel "this is our special project.'
