The church or denomination concerned with the spiritual progress of its work is seeking the leadership which is fully dedicated to a foreword and upward course. So long as men are prepared to give such leadership, and every God-called man can if he will, they will be kept busy. But as already suggested, a man who is giving less than his best to the work of the ministry need look no further for the cause of his "unemployment problem."

DO YOU WANT TO ESTABLISH A SCHOLARSHIP?

Bethany is taking steps to establish several scholarships for students entering this institution for training. Already circular letters have gone out to representative pastors on each church district to ask them to promote the idea of District Scholarships.

The District Scholarship is only one of the means of providing scholarships. Churches or Young People's groups may desire to take on this needy task. A scholarship in the amount of \$50.00 or \$60.00 per annum would mean much to Bethany students and to Bethany itself. Such scholarships would serve to increase academic efficiency as well as to stimulate personal interest in Bethany, and the promotion of the general school program.

Perhaps there are individuals who would like to follow Mrs. Wilson's splendid example, by establishing a memorial scholarship for any one of the High School grades or for the Bible Department. Again we have conceived the idea that some business concern or private establishment might be interested in sponsor ing a scholarship.

These scholarships may be perpetuated on an interest basis, providing the initial investment is large enough for this; or they may be cared for by making straight per annum payments. When these payments are made or the scholarship is established, the person making possible the scholarship will receive a receipt for the money contributed which may be used for deductions when filing the income tax re-

A special Scholarship Fund is being established and all money received for scholarships will be directed to that fund to be used for scholarships only.

HOLINESS ASSOCIATION

The National Holiness Association was first organized in 1867 as the "National Camp Meeting Association for the Promotion of Holiness." Later, the official name was changed to the "National Association for the Promotion of Holiness," and in 1950 it was changed again to that which we now use.

N. H. A. was originated and supported for many years by Methodist ministers and laymen. They were seeking a media whereby they could better promote the original Wesleyan doctrine of a second definite work of grace, in which the heart of the believer is cleansed from sin and filled with the Holy Spirit, according to Acts 1:8. Activities were largely that of organizing camp meeting over the nation where scriptural holiness was taught

Prior to the organization of N. H. A., two of the holiness denominations now in existence were organized. The Wesleyan Methodist Church in 1842, and the Free Methodist Church in 1860, both coming out of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Since the organization of N. H. A., there have been several holiness denominations formed. The result was that those who wanted emphasis on the original Methodist doctrine of heart holiness joined with one of these denominations. However, a goodly number of great souls stayed with the Methodist Church, feeling that they should preach, teach, and evangelize within the Church. The move of organizing denominations for the express purpose of preaching scriptural holiness has seemingly carried the approval of God, for a great work is being done by the various

The holiness associations on the local, county, state, and national level have continued to function, being supported by people from all denominations. However, the programs of the holiness denominations have reached such proportion and tempo that more and more of the work of spreading scriptural holiness is being done through this media. Therefore, many of the holiness associations, as such, have ceased to exist, or find it hard to function because of the lack of funds and support. For example, many of the local congregations in a given county have more in attendance at a regular mid-week prayer service than can be assembled when the monthly county holiness association meets. This is not so much a result of lack of interest on the part of holiness people in the area, as it is a multiplicity of the same type of activity and function. Thus, we find much effort being put forth in an attempt to retain a former organization and ideal, rather than the original purpose of evangelizing and teaching scriptural holiness to the unindoctrinated. In other words, an emphasis on preservation rather than evangelization.

The development of any one of the holiness denominations has progressed largely inde-It is hoped that we will be able to make a pendent of what other denominations have done, and with very little close alliance, contact, or knowledge of the other's program. In recent years, the leadership of N. H. A. has been securing the approval of the various holiness denominations by receiving them as affiliates to the National. Nearly all of them have now established this affiliate relationship. A much closer liaison between these groups, including the interdenominational groups, is vitally necessary.
