But such is nat the case. More and more people are expressing the need and urgency of having a closer fellowship with all holiness people. The need of forming a co-ordinating agency with the holiness movement, one that would truly "give scriptural holiness a united voice," has been suggested. Ways must be found of joining hands for a united front. We cannot ignore trends. The present generation is following the trend of co-operation in church, in civil areas, on community and national levels, and in all social and economic areas. Ignore these if we will, but to our own hurt. It is not a question of compromise, no never. It is a pattern and emthod we must recognize to keep abreast in evangelizing our generation. It is as impossible to ignore this fact as it would be for us to ignore new methods of travel, industry, or business.

Many of our people and pastors are co-operating whole-heartedly with other evangelicals on various levels. This is as it should be. But, seriously, how long can we co-operate with other evangelicals, where our distinctives cannot be discussed or promoted, and yet fail to co-operate with those who do believe in our distinctive doctrine, and still maintain our distinctives. There is a place for both the evangelical and the Wesleyan co-operation, and without a duplication of effort or a competitive spirit. But, if both cannot be promoted by a given individual or group, surely those who hold a distinctive doctrinal position ought to find ways of strengthening that witness.

We believe this co-ordinating agency must be formed whether it comes about through N. H. A. shifting and reorganizing its pattern, or through some other organization. The N. H. A. seems to be the logical media through which this can be done, and much of the machinery with which to do it is already there. This is especially so on the national level and is evidenced by the various commissions on Sunday Schools, youth, education, missions, etc. Other areas such as the publication of books and materials, church extension, publicity, finance, and others, need to be, and can easily be added.

On the local level much needs to be done. Witness the blessing of united missionary

Missionary representatives from each co-operative group have a schedule by which they speak and fellowship with participating churches. The week of services is then climaxed by each having its missionary representative for Sunday, and a mass rally in the afternoon or evening. This has left a great impact for the cause of missions in the city. It inspires great fellowship among those cooperating, and the community is awakened to the work being done by our people.

The leadership of N. H. A. is willing to launch heavily into this program if it will be accepted and promoted by those wanting to see the work of God and the Holy Spirit carried to this generation more than anything else. We face a crisis hour in the holiness movement. There is a new surge of interest in the work and experience of the Holy Ghost by many not in the so-called holiness movement.
