DARKNESS AND DAWN

"It was yet dark," and "it began to dawn," are significant phrases associated with the historical account of our Lord's resurrection.

With heavy hearts the devout Magdalene and her companions made their way toward the garden of Joseph in the drear gloom of the early morning. To anoint the body of Jesus who had been so cruelly crucified were they come. They knew very well that the body of Christ was imprisoned in a rock-hewn tomb, nor had they been able to decide how the great stone at the entrance could be removed, but love impelled them onward while reason sought to turn them back.

What a happy surprise awaited the women! "When they looked, they saw that the stone was rolled away . . . and entering the sepulchre, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a long white garment. . . . and he saith unto them: Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified: He is risen. . . go your way, tell His disciples and Peter that he goeth before you into Galilee: there shall ye see Him."

A darkness of soul which had hung over their hearts like a heavy cloud since the cruel crucifixion of their beloved Master, was penetrated by the glory of angelic presence and slowly the wondrous light of resurrection radiance filled and thrilled them. They must see the Lord for themselves in order to grasp the full meaning of the angel announcement, but "it began to dawn" as they stood in the presence of that heavenly

Our world of today is dark, very dark. Nothing less than blind optimism could make possible an attitude of hopefulness for this generation. The pattern is unmistakably plain. Strong political groups have divided the world and the threat of war hangs over us. Only God can save humanity from ruin, and the United Nations Organization has chosen to exclude the Almighty from its plans and programmes. Atheism in one form dominates the eastern half of the world while atheism in another form prevails in the western hemisphere. And so we are enshrouded with gloom and an horror of great darkness.

This year's celebration of our Lord's resurrection seems very timely. The triumph of Christ over the forces of death and the grave foreshadows the glorious victory which He will accomplish over evil men and evil powers which

dominate the world. The man of sin will be destroyed by the brightness of His coming, and the god of this world, the satanic adversary of man, who foments war and spreads destruction, will be imprisoned for a thousand years while peace and righteousness cover the earth.

It is yet dark, but the dawn is at hand. The risen Lord will soon appear to still the clash and clamour of sin's conflict. Then shall "the day dawn and the shadows flee away." For that hour we patiently and confidently wait.

"I LIVE ... YE ALSO!"

This is the glory of the Christian faith, the power of the Christian message. It is the one great fact which distinguishes the religion of our faith from all the others of all time.

Elaborate tombs have erected to shelter the remains of the prophets and leaders of other sects and creeds to these houses of death come worshippers with their gifts and prayers. Here in vain they "seek the living among the dead" and endeavour to gain inspiration through the remembrance of the lives of those who "now want strength to move their hands."

An empty tomb—the discovery which filled the heart of the devoted Magdalene with sorrow, is finally found to be the cause of inexpressible joy. The mournful "they have taken away my Lord, and I know not where they have laid him" gives place to the joyful "the Lord is risen indeed, and hath appeared unto Peter". The search for the body of the beloved Master ends in a happy meeting with the resurrected Saviour.

And the practical significance of Christ's victory over death and the grave is that the lifepower He possesses is communicative and is imparted to all who will receive Him by faith. Coming into the soul of the surrendered with the promise "because I live ye shall live also" the Lord Jesus invites us to share in the spoils of his remarkable victory.

Victory over sin is enjoyed through the transforming influence of His quickening presence. Ability to do and be is enjoyed "through Christ which strengtheneth". Gone is the fear of death, broken is the power of the grave for He hath declared "I am the resurrection and the life, he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live, and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die."

This is the soul-thrilling music of the Easter message. The triumph of the Christ is not only personal and historic, it is provisional and perpetual. Laying the grave clothes aside, coming forth from the rock-hewn death cell, Jesus makes the glad announcement to all who will hear and believe "because I live, ye shall live also." And whenever and wherever He finds a yielded and obedient heart the victory of the resurrection is re-enacted and the spoils of that triumph are re-

SEND THE LIGHT

The need of world evangelization is most ur-

The cry for help issues from the distressed hearts of the world's unenlightened millions. Modern science has enabled the missionary to carry the message of the heathen's plight from Africa, China, India, South America and elsewhere straight to the hearts of the people of God in lands where the Gospel banner has been unfurled. The church is well supplied with books which contain the graphic descriptions of the piteous state of those who wait for light. Men and women who have seen and left the horror of darkness which tortures and torments the soul without salvation's message of hope and grace, have written impassioned appeals for help. These Godcalled ambassadors are the mouth-piece of the unevangelized hosts who sit in darkness and cry for aid.

Perhaps no human being shares the spirit of divine compassion more than the true missionary. Having severed ties with home and homeland to carry the light to lands afar, they participate in the spirit of Him who "became poor that we through His poverty might be made rich." With hearts thus prepared in purity of devotion, these heralds of the Cross are keenly sensitive to the moral and spiritual ills which they discover on the field. I think the one who, filled with love of Christ is brought face to face and heart to heart with the tragedy of human lostness, must get very close to Him who "gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish." This is the explanation of the missionary's fervent and heart-moving plea for assistance in the great task of bringing relief to the souls distressed. Even as I write I seem to hear the pathos and plea which filled the voice of a missionary whom I heard singing—

Perishing, perishing, thronging our path-

Hearts break with burdens too heavy to bear; Jesus would save, but there's no one to tell

Many are found in the rear seats when it comes to praying for others. Might I suggest that a lack of prayer in the sanctuary denotes a lack of prayer in the home.

II. The Christian Church has taken the defensive rather than the offensive.

We are overcome rather than overcoming. Fighting with our backs to the wall rather than driving across enemy territory. A condition of sickness rather than health—being hospitalized a lot of the time nursing our bruises and attending to our sores. How different from the idea expressed in a verse of that

"Like a mighty army moves the Church of God:

Brothers, we are treading where the saints have trod;

We are not divided, All one body we, One in hope and doctrine, one in charity."

Foreward is the only word for the Christian Church to cultivate and put into practiceunless we see progress we shall see stagnation. III. The Christian Church lacks the witness it should have.

The early church went everywhere preaching the Gospel. Not all preachers—but men endued with a peculiar zeal for what they believed and felt. A Christian was one to be feared. They began to "turn the world upside down" so much so that open persecution was the habitual order of the day. To live for Christ one day meant you might die for him the next. They hazarded their lives for Jesus'

Can we truthfully sing? "Faith of our fathers living still, In spite of dungeon fire and sword, O how our hearts beat high with joy Whene'er we hear that glorious word!

Faith of our fathers, holy faith! We will be true to thee till death". We think more of the sentiment in that verse than we think of the faith. It is my firm conviction that we need a revival and if all the readers of this paper feel the same, I am believing God that we can have it.

May we, as David, pray for an urgent sense of the NEED OF REVIVAL and then do our part to bring it to pass.
