THE SCRIPTURES HAVE NOW APPEARED IN 1,092 LANGUAGES

Some part of the Bible has been published in 1,092 languages and dialects as of December 31, 1955, according to a statement issued by the American Bible Society. Eight new languages have been added to the list since the last report.

Languages in which the whole Bible has been published 207.

Languages in which the whole New Testament has been published 265.

Languages in which at least a Gospel or other whole book has been published 620.

Total languages in which some part of the Bible has been published 1,092.

There are some 80 languages in which short passages or collections of passages have been published, but in which no complete book of the Bible has appeared.—Conquest.

The priest told her to take a pillow, go up into the church tower, and toss the feathers to the wind. She did so, and when she returned, he asked her to describe what had happened. Then he said, "Now you must gather up every feather and put it back into the pillow," She protested, "But it is impossible." He replied, "No more impossible than for you to track down and destroy every untruth you have told about your neighbors."

"Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor" (Exod. 20:16). That means you and me. Never mind the other party. A great many of us need to have our gossiping tongues trimmed down to size. "What I say goes, and I've found

Gossip, someone has said, is something that goes in both ears and comes out of the mouth greatly enlarged.

Why do we gossip? At times it is done ignorantly. We hear a story which sounds plausible, so we pass it on, not knowing that it is not true. We need to check on the authenticity of a statement before we buzz it over the telephone wires. Better still, let us not buzz at all.

Some people gossip just because they enjoy talking. They have "talkitus." Talking gives them a certain satisfaction. They enjoy being the first to report news.

Often gossip is prompted by jealousy. Someone gets ahead of us, and we can't stand it. So we start little whisperings about him. In all of this there is lack of regard for truth and lack of love for our fellow man. The Christian religion teaches us to love one another in our speech as well as otherwise.

A minister was approached by a busybody who wanted to tell about the wrongdoings of a man in the church. The minister turned to her and asked, "Does anyone else know this besides you?" "No," was the answer. "Then," said the wise minister, "go home and hide it at the feet of Jeseus, and never speak of it again unless God leads you to speak to the man himself. If the Lord wants to bring a scandal upon His church, let Him do it, but don't you be the instrument to cause it."

Take that gossip to the Lord in prayer. Ask Him to help that needy person solve problems. It is well for us to remember that mansions in the sky cannot be built out of mud thrown at others.

Cancel every unkind word with a good one if possible. Town boys were talking about another boy. One said, "He is slow in games." "Yes," replied the other, "but he always plays fair." "He's so stupid in school," said the first. "But he always studies hard," answered the second.

Suppose the next time we hear an unkind word, we try to cancel it by putting a kind one in its place. Let us talk about the good things people do. Let us pick out the good things about the church for our conversation. That would be Christ's way.

those who have the keeping of souls. Pastors and ministers must, of course, rebuke the fallen, but when they see that the fallen are sorry they are to comfort them. "Brethern," he says, "if any man be overtaken with a fault, do not aggravate his grief, do not scold him, but lift him up and gently restore his faith. If you see a brother despondent over a sin he has committed, run up to him, reach out your hand to him, comfort him with the gospel, and embrace him like a mother. He must be dealt with in a spirit of meekness and not in a spirit of severity. A repentant sinner is not to be given gall and vinegar."

And the beloved John Wesley makes these remarks on this same text:

"Brethren, if a man be overtaken"-By surprise, ignorance, or stress of temptation, ye who are spiritual—Who continue to walk by the Spirit, restore such a one, By reproof, instruction, or exhortation. Everyone who can ought to help herein; only is the spirit of meekness. This is essential to a spiritual man. And in this lies the whole force of the cure: considering thyself—the plural is beautifully changed into the singular. Let each take heed to himself; lest thou also be tempted—temptation easily and swiftly passes from one to another; especially if a man endeavors to cure another without preserving his own meekness."

Thus we have seen what the scriptures say, what two of the greatest commentators say, and what two of the greatest religious reformers say about Paul's words to the churches of Galatia. Surely it is our duty and our joy to "Rescue the perishing and care for the the dying, snatch them in pity from sin and the grave." Rewards come here and hereafter!

GOD, OUT-POURED

The Hebrew word "El-Shaddai" signifies the "All sufficient God." The original word signifies an exhaustless fountain that pours itself out in everlasting fulness, without stint, without limit, without the possibility of being exhausted. The root word is used in various ways, as, for instance, sometimes it signifies a mother's breast supplying an abundance of milk for the infant; and it also is used to signify a great spring that never runs dry gushing from the mountain side.

The word could also be translated "the outpoured God," corresponding to the idea of Pentecost, the outpouring of the fulness of the Holy Ghost from the ascended Jesus, for Jesus is the infinite Fountain, and out of Him is poured the everlasting river of the Holy

Now, put this name, "El-Shaddai," the "Allsufficient God," the "out-poured God," in connection with the words, "Walk before me, and be thou perfect," showing that Abram had not strength in himself to accomplish such a thing or to enter such a life, but that every step of that walk was to be attended by The Divine River, this out-poured Fountain, this everlasting presence of the "El-Shaddai." -Geo.
