# So You Want To Preach?

An article that came into my possession recently was written to give advice to those who are contemplating full-time service for the Lord. Having had only two years of experience in the ministry, there is not much that I could say about the subject that would be very authoritative. However, think over carefully and prayerfully the following suggestions:

1. Be Sure to Count the Cost.

Jesus demands of us a love for Him that is greater than our love for our closest family relationships. The "thrill" or "glamour" of being a preacher will not compensate for the trials and hardships of the ministry. The shepherd is called upon to exercise more self-denial and make more personal sacrifice than the flock that is committed to his care.

2. Be Sure Not to Get in a Hurry.

I am not suggesting that there is time to waste or that we can pursue another profession for several years and then turn to the ministry. We need to take time to make our decision as to whether or not this is God's will. Once the decision is reached, we must act upon it, and take time to prepare adequately for the task. There is no premium on ignorance!

3. Be Sure that Your Motive is Pure.

Why do you want to preach? Is it because of pride, family choice, or any of the privileges that are peculiar to the ministry? Oswald Chambers once said, "It may be harder to face God with your motive than to face the congregation with your message."

4. Be Sure of Your Call.

According to the Bible, it is the Holy Ghost who "calls" or "separates" men (and women) for the ministry. The desire, opportunity, or ability to preach may be a part of the call, but should never be thought of as a call to preach unless the Holy Ghost sanctions it. I have sometimes felt, as have others of our young preachers, that were it not for the call of God felt in my heart, that I would leave the ministry at once and enter a secular profession and serve God as a good layman.

#### PAUL'S CRUCIFIXION

Gal. 2:20 "I am crucified with Christ." Ga 6:14 "But God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world."

Paul's crucifixion was a two-fold spiritual experience. First, it was inward. Crucified with Christ. Secondly, it was outward. To the world, and the world unto me.

Why are there not more "Paul's" in the church today? Because there are too many "Sauls." Not everyone wants to be crucified dead to self. Saul wants to parade around pretending to be Paul.

When crucified with Christ and to the world, three things are evident in the Christian's life: (1) We are drawn to Christ. Crucified by Christ, in Christ, and with Christ. "Oh that Old Rugged Cross, so despised by the world, has a wondrous attraction for me." (2) It separates the spiritual from the carnal and wordly minded. "And they that are Christ's have crucified the flesh with the affections and lusts" (Gal. 5:24). (3) It produces a yearning desire to win lost souls. This was evidenced in the Apostle Paul's life, also on the day of Pentecost, when one hundred twenty were crucified, then baptized by the Holy Ghost, becoming dead, yet alive unto God. Peter the coward became Cephas the Rock. Those who followed Christ to Calvary afar off, now set the world on fire. Self was gone, nothing else in life mattered but to witness in Jerusalem, Judea, and Samaria, and to preach the gospel to the uttermost parts of the world.

Winning those who know not Christ is the main business of every Christian. This is the work dearest to the heart of our Lord. For this purpose He left Heaven, died and rose from the dead. #### THOUGHTS ON THE COVENANT

It is not unknown to us what the word "covenant" signifies. Certainly each of us has a mental formulation of its implications though the ability to frame it into verbal form might fail us for the moment. However, if we have had affiliation with the Church Militant, we have most assuredly been made conscious of the great Eternal Covenant. Shame on the church that gives neither witness nor expression to that Sacred Charter! Shame did I say? How weak the expression! But let it suffice since at the moment I am wanting for a stronger and

First of all, a covenant is an agreement, or a compact, between individuals. To this simple definition we willingly give consent. But it will also be admitted that such an agreement can be had between God and individuals. In the interests of clarity, and more particularly authority, let us inquire of the Scripture.

There is to be found in the Book of God many references to both of the above suggested forms. For instance, the patriarch Abraham made a covenant with Abimelech. "And Abraham took sheep and oxen and gave them to Abimelech, and both of them made a covenant" (Gen. 21:27). Secondly, there is recorded the covenant between Laban and Jacob. "Now therefore come thou, let us make a covenant, I and thou; and let it be for a witness between me and thee." (Gen. 31:44). And again, Jonathan and David made a covenant. "Then Jonathan and David made a covenant, because he loved him as his own soul" (1 Sam. 18:3). These are but a few illustrations which I have selected. There are several more that could be mentioned, but they are not needed.

The Scriptures are not wanting, either, for instances in which God made a covenant with individuals. "And God spake unto Noah, and to his sons with him, saying, and I, behold, I establish my covenant with you, and with your seed after you; . . . I do set my bow in the cloud, and it shall be for a token of a covenant between me and the earth" (Gen. 9:8, 9, 13). Again, God made a covenant with Abraham. "In the same day the Lord made a covenant with Abraham, saying . . ." (Gen. 15:18). God also made a covenant with His people Israel. "These are the words of the covenant, which the Lord commanded Moses to make with the children of Israel in the land of Moab, beside the covenant which he made with them in Horeb" (Deut. 29:1).
