churches. Thank God for all the aggressiveness in evidence, but the spirit of real evangelism needs to sweep in like a flood! And it will if we will continue in faith and prayer and obedience to the great commission.

We have a right to claim the promise of Jesus to go with us if we are really going in his name to "make disciples." Did he not say, "And,lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world" (Matt. 28:20)?

We have a right to believe and expect that genuine heaven-blessed revival will strengthen and build up the church. No, God is not going to allow us to use him for selfish ends! But the church is Christ's own institution in the world. The great revivals of history have come among God's people and in the church. If God does not want revival to come in and through his church, then why the messages in the Bible, particularly in Revelation, to the church?

This puts a tremendous burden upon the leaders of our churches. If God can get the ear of the angels of the churches (See Rev. 1:20) we are already a long way on the road to victory!

What is all this going to cost? How much time and effort? This scribe does not profess to know, but he does remember the Word of God tells us, "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit" (John 12:24). We are never going to get very far in this holy conflict until the vision and the call of God grip us as they did Isaiah when he cried, "Here am I; send me" (Isa. 6:8).

In this launching out for God in prayer, in witnessing and evangelizing and in strengthening the church, we cannot wait for others to move. We must respond to God's call whether or not anyone else ever does. Some will hear but will make little response, others will go all-out for God and souls. Doubtless there are those who never will get going. But for others we can not wait—our time is now! If a forward movement for Jesus and his church has not already begun within us and our affairs. God help us to let it begin this moment!

"He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the church" (Rev. 2:11).

"A holy Christian life is made up of a number of small things; little words, not eloquent sermons; little deeds, not miracles of battle, nor one great heroic deed of martyrdom; the little constant sunbeam, not the lightning. The avoidance of little evils, little sins, little inconsistencies, little weaknesses, little follies and indiscretions, little indulgences of the flesh: the avoidance of such little things make up the beauty of a holy life."
