Paul and Mary Sanders had invited us up to Boksburg to spend Christmas with them, and what a happy time we had together! Many of the presents that we received were from friends in the homeland. We take this opportunity to say, "Thank you, and may God bless you." There were also many pretty cards. Since Christmas a few more parcels have arrived and the children get very excited when these parcels come. Thy greatly enjoy the things you have sent. And so do we.

It was very interesting to see the work that Paul and Mary are doing in two large Native townships. Hundreds of little children attend their four Sunday schools. Three of these classes were conducted in the open, just off the street, near some friendly Christian home. The new church they are building in Davietown is nearly ready for the tile roof. This will be a lovely building when it is completed. Our last Sunday school was conducted within the roofless walls of this building. We are thrilled to know that at last we have Missionary work on the Reef, South Africa's great gold mining area. One of Paul and Mary's chief handicaps is: lack of trained workers. We are glad that one native family has now moved up from Paulpietersburg to help in this great work.

It was thrilling to be able to discuss the needs of the Rhodesian field. Harold Kierstead and family came down for our bi-annual meeting held at Hartland. One of our senior men Rev. Johanisi Nkosi, is taking a year off from his regular duties to attend our Bible school at Louwsburg. We feel proud to have such vigorous and youthful Christian men, who have the ambition and humility to do this. There are others who also have similar desires. We are glad that we at last have a Bible School of our own. We trust that the African church will take advantage of this great opportunity and give the school the support that it deserves. Three of the graduates from this Bible School were set up as preachers, during this Hartland meeting. We probably could use thirty or more right now if we had them.

What we see and hear from all areas of our Mission Field, gives us the impression that opportunity is surrounding us at every point. There seems to be "a great door and effectual opened unto us, and there are many adversaries," as the Apostle Paul put it. Humanly speaking, there are many limiting factors, lack of man-power, frailty of humanity, physically, lack of finances, etc. But we are glad that God is not limited and that He can and does work through small and frail instruments.

We feel the need and are praying for revival on the African field. This of course enrages the enemy and he is throwing greater forces into the battle. But our God can, and will defeat him.
