## SOME FACTS ABOUT THE ORIGIN OF THE REFORMED BAPTIST CHURCH

It seems that the ministers who believed in the doctrine continued to preach it, so the whole matter came to another crisis in 1888. Let us step into that Conference, and hear what was said at that time concerning the doctrine and the man who taught it.

A Resolution passed by the Free Christian Baptist Conference Oct. 15, 1888, from year book, 1888, pages

1. Whereas, For several years there has existed amongst the ministers of this Elders' Conference, a difference of belief and teaching on the doctrine known amongst us as "Instantaneous Entire Sanctification" as a "second work" and

2. Whereas, This teaching has been declared by this Conference and by our General Conference as well, not to be now, nor never to have been the belief of this denomination, and

3. Whereas, The persistent schismatical teaching of these doctrines has wrought great harm to several of our churches, and has injured all our denominational work, and

4. Whereas, We have labored a number of years in the spirit of brotherly care to bring about unity of faith and feeling, until we have become satisfied that this is not possible, and

5. Whereas, We think it essential to our denominational prosperity that our ministers as leaders and teachers, should be in harmony on all such important doctrines, and

6. Whereas, We find that at the close of another year in the application of the usual denominational tests. a number of our brethren still dissenting from the beliefs of this Conference.

7. Therefore Resolved, That this Elders' Conference in heartfelt sorrow and in the spirit of brotherly kindness, and in the spirit of denominational loyalty in doing the only thing that now seems possible to us, and just to all our cherished interests, declare that this Elders' Conference is not in sympathy with and cannot longer fellowship as ministers of this Conference, brethren who teach or preach the doctrine of "Instantaneous Entire Sanctification."

8. And we hereby withdraw fellowship from Revs. George W. McDonald, William Kinghorn, Bamford Colpitts, G. Bennett Trafton, and George T. Hartley."

This vote was taken at the Conference at Blissville, N. B., and was carried by a vote of 55 to 6.

The first resolution made it impossible for any person to hold any office in a church and the ministers found themselves out altogether, thus quite a group of ministers and laymen found themselves with no church home. Doctrinally they would be mitfits with any other church in the provinces. What they did seems a very natural and reasonable thing for them to do. Another sect, yes, but the reader of church history with a bit of careful study as to why some denominations came into being will be much less intolerant toward the multiplicity of sects.

Next in order I shall follow the steps that led to the organization of the Reformed Baptist Denomination. For this I shall quote some directly from the early hand-book of the denomination, one of which I am happy to have in my possession. In this publication was also printed in abbreviation the minutes of the two first Alliances. To quote:-
