not made, not created, but begotten. The Holy Ghost is of the Father and the Son, neither made, nor created, nor begotten, but proceeding; and in this Trinity none is afore or after another; none is greater or less than another." It is hardly necessary to say, that we accept these doctrines not because we understand them, but because the plain statements of scripture drive us to these conclusions. In the same way we formulate and believe many other doctrines—Eternity, for example, is impossible of comprehension, yet clearly in bible truth. Christ Himself is beyond us, yet manifest.
