Leaving Louwsburg early in the morning of April 8 we arrived at the great new native location of Daveyton (about 35 miles from Johannesburg) near midnight. Services there were held in the newly erected and not yet fully completed church built under the leadership of Rev. H. P. Sanders.

At Daveyton we found a native township perhaps equalled nowhere in the Union of South Africa for modern conveniences. Lovely little houses, running water, electricity and paved streets in construction. To the outer eye one could well rejoice at the advances of civilization but in the midst of all these attainments we discovered hearts hardened by sin, slaves to the god of this world. Living as they are in the heart of Africa's gold fields their love is more for gold than for God. with of the foot out baist of jon

The students labored faithfully in carrying on children's meeting, doing home visitation, and preaching in the evenings. Some victories we trust were won and God's people strengthened.

BREYTEN

Turning back towards home after a week at Daveyton we stopped at the little railway junction town of Breyten. Conditions there were found to be worse in every way than at Daveyton. People are living in the greatest squalor both moral and hygenic. The houses are for the most part low mud huts covered with pieces of corrugated iron roofing held down by stones. To look at the place one would be tempted to say there must be enough stones on top of the houses to fill the Bay of Fundy!

We selected a suitable spot in an open field at the back of the location and set up the tent. The students stayed at the home of our Bible woman who is faithfully endeavoring to savour that wicked place with the salt of real salvation. The first service was one of real blessing and several came out for prayer. The following night the devil made his counter attack sending in a group of youth bent on mischief. It was a hard battle that night. But we called upon all Christians present to make special prayer the following day and, although there was some annoyance each night afterward, we did not have a recurrance of that extent. Several victories were won, and some even from among those who had at first come bent on mischief. God's power knows no limits! or small whether glam ANOTIA in the spotlight, or un

Leaving Breyten we arrived next at Altona where our forces were divided, part going to the Klipvaal outpost where the tent was erected, and the other part going to the Mozaan outpost where services were held in the little church building. I stayed with the Haywood's at the Mission going alternatively to each outpost. God worked in the hearts of the people and we felt a good work was done. There were some who sought forgiveness, others cleansing and others gave themselves to the Lord's work. The students worked hard travelling over the hills in kraal visitation each day. Whenever possible we missionaries joined them.

HARTLAND

It had been the original plan to go for a week at Calvary Mission but just prior to our intended arrival we received a message from the native elder in charge saying that due to certain reasons he was unable to proceed with the proposed

meetings. Arrangements were hurriedly made with Rev. Sibiya at Hartland for us to go to the Nkembeni outpost. Since there was no way in which I could remain I came home for the week. On my return to attend the closing service on Sunday I discovered that the man of the kraal where the students were staying had died during the week. It is sad to know that he went out in darkness in spite of having known the light for a long time. Surely God did all in His power to arrest that man, even to sending those consecrated workers who in his last hours endeavored to lead him to accept that light which he so well knew. Due to that sad event in the area it was difficult to carry on the meetings and not much outwardly was accomplished. We all wonder if the whole purpose of our going to that area instead of Calvary was God's last effort to reach that one darkened soul. God does indeed love the individual.

IMPRESSIONS

Perhaps the strongest impression with which we return is that at each place we should have been able to stay from two weeks to a month. In a week's meetings conviction is just beginning to settle upon hearts.

A second impression is the terrible moral filth in which many of the people of these native locations live. Surely it is not easy for Christian young people to keep true to the standards of the gospel of holiness. They need the prayers

A third impression is the wonderful effect of real salvation in the heart of a person. More than once I was thrilled to the depths of my being at the ringing, definite testimonies of these Bible students as they spoke forth His praises
