

EXPEDITION IN JORDAN UNCOVERS BIBLICAL CITY OF GIBEON

American archaeologists, digging on the present site of el-Jib, an Arab village in Jordan about eight miles north of Jerusalem, this summer discovered the ancient City of Gibeon. Gibeon is mentioned forty-three times in the Old Testament as "a great city . . . one of the royal cities."

The expedition, which left for the Holy Land in May, was sponsored by Penn's University Museum and the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, California. It was led by Dr. James B. Pritchard, of the Divinity School, and a staff of six other Americans.

One of the largest cities yet discovered in Palestine, Gibeon was found to spread over sixteen acres, with a thick wall surrounding it. Ten feet wide, the wall is enlarged at vital points to a width of twenty-six feet, and is fortified with towers. Also laid bare, in addition to the fortifications, were parts of the city's water system.

Clinching identification was the finding of inscriptions bearing in ancient Hebrew letters the name "Gibeon." It was the first time in the sixty-six years of Palestine archaeology that this kind of definite identification has been found.—Conquest.
