However, the time always comes, sooner or later, when our self-sufficiency disappears, and we find ourselves, in the words of Paul, "at the end of our tether" (II Cor. 1:9, Phillips Translation). One man testified to the fact that he was in this "valley" for nearly a year, and that it was not until God showed him a new path of service that he found his way out.

The truth of the matter is that when things are going along smoothly, we are prone to feel that God is unnecessary and that we can pretty well manage our own business. During these times God has difficulty to reach us with His will. Paul discovered by personal experience that his periods of extremity were God's times of opportunty.

In these times, God has opportunity to reveal Himself to man—His will and purpose for him. Many a man has found that his hour of extremity was also his hour of divine revelation and light.

God has opportunity to teach man a very necessary lesson, that "It is better to trust in God than in man." Man has the power to do much for men, but he is helpless before the deeper needs of the soul. Only God can help then!

Finally, God has opportunity to prove his willingness to share life's experiences with us. We men think we can "paddle our own canoe" some of the time, but we cannot do it all the time. This God knows and seeks to overcome by giving to us the benefit of constant light and guidance.
