Greetings from Africa! How can I greet you? The Zulus say, "Sanibona" (we see you) but how can I say that when you are so far away (7,000 miles) and I cannot see you. I'll just have to say, "Hi, Crusaders" or just plain "Hello!"

I suppose you all remember about the Rosemond Dow Memorial Fund? I am sure each one of you had a part in raising that \$1,000. That was a very good effort and shows that you are really and truly Crusaders. Crusaders tackle hard jobs and then work hard at them until they are accomplished.

What has happened to this Rosemond Dow money? Well, so far, it is still in the Bank as we are having a hard time to get the government's permission to use the place of land that the town of Livingstone wants to give us for a church site. You must all pray that God will make the government agree to allow us to use this site if it is His will for us to build your church there. If He wants the church to be built in a better place pray that we will get that place soon. Don't be discouraged—Crusaders don't give up that easily! The devil fights new churches even harder out here as he knows he will lose many of his soldiers when they get saved in these new churches.

I have heard that you Crusaders are looking for another hard job to tackle. Is that true? How hard a job do you want this time? Would you like to work at something different?

In a short time we expect to get a big piece of land (about 100 acres) from the Southern Rhodesian government on which to build a Hospital, a Mission House—perhaps even a school and a church. We shall need a lot of money for all these buildings. This place is quite far out in the forest or "bush" as it is called out here. It is so far out that there are real live animals all around—elephants, leopards, snakes . . . and even lions perhaps. But there are many heathen living all around . . . lots of little boys and girls who need to be saved. who need a place where they can be treated when they are sick, and who even need a school and church to get to.

How would you like to help build a Hospital for these boys and girls? That would really be something really special to try and do.
