friend's death, the anguish of mind he suffered in the severe electrical storm, the tormenting sense of condemnation which harrassed him in the cloister, he found ready and complete deliverance from when he trusted in Christ. Rejecting all merely human means and methods, he looked to Jesus alone, and, like another who would reach that same place of believing, he "felt his heart strangely warmed".

And this is one of the great freedoms of the Gospel. This is the liberty to which God calls us through His Son, Jesus Christ.

To come to Him "as we are", counting our own righteousnesses as filthy rags, our own works as nothing of merit, we may find, through simple faith in the merit of Calvary's Saviour, the blessed assurance of salvation.

"I lay my sins on Jesus, the spotless Lamb of God,  
He bears them all and frees us from the accursed load;  
I bring my guilt to Jesus, to wash away the stain,  
White in His blood most precious, "till not a spot remain".

This is the freedom Luther found. This is the freedom we too may find and enjoy. And the message of freedom we proclaim to all sin-bound, sin-burdened souls. "He whom the Son makes free, is free indeed!"
