### MRS. G. M. KIERSTEAD WRITES:

As soon as college closed, last Friday afternoon, we packed our few things in the car and started towards Johannesburg. With us was one of our teachers from here and also an African teacher, who taught here for several years, but has now left, so as to have more time to give to the work of the Teachers' Christian Fellowship.

We had hoped to reach Boksburg quite early in the evening but first a flat tire held us up and then as we entered Boksburg we lost our way, so it was about 10.30 p. m. by the time we finally reached the home of Rev. and Mrs. Paul Sanders. There we received a warm welcome and were happy to have completed our journey for that day.

Saturday was a beautiful day. I spent the day visiting while the men were busy with work, etc., outside. In the afternoon they spent some time puttying the glass in the windows of our new church.

Sunday was another lovely day and we were soon on our way to the Daveyton location. Just before we left, two young men arrived, on bicycles. One was from the Hartland area, the other from Msobotsheni and they are working in Johannesburg now. They rode with us the rest of the way, so we were able to talk with them, and we were glad that they seem to be doing well spiritually.

after in that way, but the little Bantu babies seem to thrive on it. A goodly number were in the service on Sunday.

At the close of the service there were a number of testimonies and it was good to hear the notes of victory.

It was such a joy to see so many of our own people from the Altona district. Some are working there but others have moved their families and are settled there. Many of them I had not seen since I was taken sick.

One young man who went to Altona school, and whose mother I knew well, said to me, "Nkosikayi, it's almost as good as seeing my own mother," and as we shook hands to say good-bye, he left a piece of money in my hand and said to get something to eat on our way home.

The girl who came with us, to Vryheid from Altona, was also there. She lives only four houses away from our church, but she married a man from another church and her husband does not always allow her to attend ours. Do pray that Jostina will be allowed to come where she will receive real spiritual food.

But perhaps my greatest joy was to see Anna Sukozi, the daughter of Triphina Maibi, one of our workers, Anna was at Altona M. S. going to school, when we reached Africa. Later she married but I think her husband's people did not like her and drove her away. She helped Mrs. Parks while they were in Africa and later left for Johannesburg, and I didn't know just where she was. She lives very far from our church, and the service was finished by the time she arrived. She told me that at first she could find no church like ours, but eventually she joined the Salvation Army and now is an officer. I cannot tell you how glad I was to find that she is following the Lord.

Elias and Marie Dlamini, who we knew first at Ntuvane, then later at Piet Retief and now are settled in Wattville Location, were there with their two daughters. Their testimonies showed a growth in spiritual things, that I was glad to hear.

Others were there too, old friends and quite a number of new people, who I was glad to meet. At last we said good-bye and reached Boksburg about five o'clock. It had been a full day, but a very blessed one in the Lord.

On Monday we left Boksburg for Vryheid and reached here that evening. The Lord gave us a very nice journey but as we were nearing Vryheid we ran into a storm. At one time we seemed to be right in the midst of it, with lightning playing all around us. The heavy rain did not start until we reached home so we were indeed grateful to God for His watchful care over us.

I feel that we have much to thank God for. The work in the Benoni Location is a real challenge and Brother and Sister Sanders are doing a good work. Hundreds of Bantu were there to be reached. Let us continue to pray for this great work.
