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## DENOMINATIONAL-WIDE BIBLE QUIZ

Beginning January 1, 1959, our Young People's Association will be sponsoring a Denomination-Wide Bible Quiz on the Gospel of Luke. An announcement will appear in the January 1st issue of the Highway giving information regarding rules, regulations, and enrollment. All local societies, no matter how small, should plan now to enter the quiz. Presidents or secretaries should write for the required information as soon as possible after January 1st.

Each team will consist of four quizzers and each society should decide, through local competition, who are their four best quizzers. All inter-society quizzers must be completed by March 15. Youth presidents and pastors will be responsible for preparing questions and conducting quiz or local competition. All district play-offs will be supervised by a district quizmaster appointed by the Denominational Young People's Society. After March 15 arrangements will be made for local societies to compete with other societies to decide a district champion. By approximately May 15 we should have six district winners who will then play-off until there are two remaining teams. These will compete at the Annual Youth Rally at Beulah in July of 1959 for the Grand Championship.

The Wesleyan Methodist, The Free Methodists, and Youth For Christ have sponsored similar quizzes and have found them to be very profitable. We are urgently requesting all youth presidents and pastors to ensure that their society is enrolled in this quiz. No young person can study the Gospel of Luke and not be much better spiritually because of it. This is the greatest project ever to be sponsored by our youth organization, and we would like as near to 100% participation as possible.

The Grey-Cup Championships, The Stanley-Cup Play-offs, The World Series, and other great sport events will fade into the background when our young people begin to catch the competitive spirit created by this quiz. Its enthusiasm will become contagious during the winter and spring months and reach its peak when people of all ages fill the Beulah tabernacle to capacity in July of 1959 to witness eight of our top notch young people play-off for the Grand Championship, answering questions on the world's greatest Book.

Christ will be honored and our young people saturated with a knowledge of the Gospel of Luke because of this Bible quiz.
