EDITORIALS

A NEW TABERNACLE FOR BEULAH CAMP

As announced in a previous issue of the Highway, Alliance approval has been given to a Tabernacle-building project at Beulah Camp. No, the fine old building which has been the setting for the Beulah Camp Meetings of sixty years is not to be replaced. This new Tabernacle is to provide accommodations for the children who are attending Beulah in greater numbers each year.

For a number of years the Daily Vacation Bible Schools held in conjunction with Beulah Camp Meeting have been carried on under a lack-of-space handicap. The children and their teachers have been moving about from the Hotel dining room, to cottages, verandahs, hill-tops, and elsewhere, there being no building available which provided adequate accommodations. The teachers and children have co-operated cheerfully in the face of these difficulties, but the word that plans were being laid for the erection of a Tabernacle for D.V.B.S. classes and meetings was received with great enthusiasm. And now Rev. Jack Stevens who is heading up this project, is taking definite steps to implement plans for building. Let us give him every assistance that this worthy undertaking may be successful and may culminate in the dedication of this new Tabernacle at next year's Beulah Camp Meeting.

DOWN FROM THE MOUNTAIN!

Once more we bid fond farewell to the summer season. Behind us are the joys and blessings of Camp Meeting and vacation, before us the labours inevitable.

We are thankful to God and His people for the privileges of the Camp Meeting and vacation period. For a short time we have lived apart from the rush and routine of the life of the world and the demands of vocational service. During that time we have been led of the Spirit to witness special revelations of Divine power and glory. And now we are prepared to follow the Master down the mountain side, back to the valley and those who need comfort, healing, and the grace of God. May it please the Lord to give us displays of His power in redeeming the sin-bound and transforming those over whom evil has too long held sway!

GROUP INSURANCE

Group Insurance for our ministers is one of the fine things our Alliance has adopted of late. It provides assistance for a minister's wife and family when death strikes to the amount of One Thousand Dollars and double the amount providing death is accidental. Since we have no pension plan in our setup this insurance is a definite necessity and should be maintained.

The Alliance has voted to share one half the Premium, with the pastors assuming the other half. Each church is asked to send Six Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$6.50) to the Alliance Treasurer annually.

The Alliance voted this year to add this item to the Church Budget, but the Committee forgot to do so, hence, this reminder. Will our pastors please present this matter to their churches. Your co-operation will be appreciated.
