ANOTHER TAVERN TALE

A nineteen-year-old boy, twice torpedoed and rescued at sea, a merchant marine veteran, was sentenced to forty years in prison by a Chicago judge on January 18, 1946, for having beaten a girl to death with his fists and having left her nude body in an alley. The evidence brought out in the trial showed that the youth, visiting relatives in the city, had spent a considerable part of a night at a tavern, had been served whiskies and four bottles of beer inside of one hour, and was never asked his age or identification papers. In commenting, the judge said: "If he had not been served with intoxicating liquor at the age of nineteen he would not have been standing before me today. If there had been no tavern open at four

As Camp-meetings come and go, Riverside has had its place again among the Holiness Camps of America. I felt that the spirit and manner of Rev. Rees were so perfectly in keeping with the truth he preached that one could see as well as hear what God's grace can do. How wonderful when the preacher is himself a sermon!

The music for the Camp was in charge of Jack and Charlene MacKenzie. This young couple holds a big place in the hearts of the people who attend Riverside. Always at the service, and always happy in the Lord, they contribute much to the Camp. Others helped with the "specials" and all were enjoyed as they delivered their sermons in song.

The Missionary service this year was the best, in my estimation, ever. Rev. B. C. Cochrane was in charge and had a fine program arranged. Our returned missionaries, Rev. and Elsie Morgan were the principal speakers. It is a joy to have them with us again, and the picture painted by brother Morgan of Africa and its desperate needs was the most enlightening and graphic I have heard. It is impossible to measure the effect this message had on the people, but one could sense an upsurge of interest that just cannot die.

Riverside effected a change in my own attitude as it proceeded. I was much discouraged at the beginning but the last few days of the Camp did much to enhearten me. The Grounds at Riverside could be made beautiful. Large maple and elm trees are a natural beauty. The entire setting of the Camp, removed as it is from the noise of traffic, offers a great deal. Some delapidated cottages need to be repaired or removed, and with some early advertising and good programing, Riverside could be greatly improved. The offering raised by Rev. Leslie Hicks the last Sunday afternoon was a good omen. The people are interested, and are ready to support this Camp.

Yes, Riverside needs to be maintained. It can make a wholesome contribution to the spiritual life of the churches in the area. I understand the Youth Camp preceding the regular Camp was highly successful this season. These things are good and who can tell the reach of influence upon young and old they exert.

We had many visitors - ministers and lay-folk - at the Camp. The help given by them was appreciated, and we pray they may come again. God bless Riverside Camp, and all who help to make it possible.
