"But the song you sang then was the song you sang just now. I heard the words perfectly:

"We are Thine, do Thou befriend us,
Be the Guardian of our way."

"Those words stirred up many memories in my heart. I began to think of my childhood and my God-fearing mother. She had many, many times sung that song to me. But she died all too soon, otherwise much in my life would no doubt have been different.

"When you had finished your song, it was impossible for me to take aim at you again. I thought, 'The Lord, who is able to save that man from certain death, must surely be great and mighty'—and my arm of its own accord dropped limp at my side.

"Since that time I have wandered far and wide; but when I just now saw you standing there praying just as on that other occasion, I recognized you. Then my heart was wounded by your song; now I wish that you would help me to find a cure for my sick soul."

Deeply moved, Mr. Sankey threw his arms about the man who, in the days of the war had been his enemy. And that Christmas night the two went together to the manger in Bethlehem. There the stranger found Him who was their common Saviour, the Good Shepherd, who seeks for the lost sheep until He finds it. And when He has found it, He lays it on His shoulders, rejoicing.
