



MISSIONARY DAY AT BEULAH CAMP

Of increasing significance to the programme of our annual Beulah Camp Meeting is Missionary Day. On this special day, the last Thursday of the Camp, meetings are held to report on our missionary work at home and abroad, and to present the challenges on both fronts.

This year's Missionary Day was one of the best we have known. At 9.30 in the morning the first service was held when Miss Myra Martin, R. N., missionary of the World Gospel Mission in India, gave a most inspiring and gripping missionary message.

At 10.30 the annual Home Mission Rally was held under the direction of Rev. R. H. Nicholson. This was a thrilling service. Of special blessing to all present were the messages of the fine, consecrated men who are ministering in Home Mission churches and projects. We were justly proud of the men and their messages.

It was a great joy to hear, from our Alliance Superintendent, Rev. F. A. Dunlop, of the organization of a new church at Deer Island, N. B., and of plans for a new building and pastoral service in this new territory. Also of the opening of a new field in New Denmark, N. B., progress of building at Houlton, Maine, plans for building at Amherst and Ingomar, Nova Scotia, and the hope of a new work at Lincoln, Maine. Report of the Home Mission Treasurer revealed that a record amount of money had been raised for home missions in the past church year. This service was climaxed with a challenging message by Rev. R. H. Nicholson who has been doing a splendid work as President of the Home Mission Board and Field Evangelist.

At 2.00 p. m. a fine missionary address was delivered by Dr. George Warner, President of World Gospel Mission, from the text "Multitudes in the valley of decision". From his experiences in visiting the mission fields of the world Dr. Warner described the needs as he witnessed them among people of many lands. Mrs. Warner also spoke briefly but effectively. The Warners and Miss Martin were visiting Beulah Camp for the first time and their presence and messages added much to the Missionary Day Programme.

At 7.30 in the evening the Missionary Day came to a close with the annual Foreign Mission Rally. The financial statement of the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board showed that more than \$25,000 had been given for the work of spreading the Gospel among the unenlightened, \$15,000 beyond the budget allocations. Featured speakers of this Rally were Bill and Elsie Morgan and Dr. R. S. Nicholson. Hearts were deeply stirred as the messages were delivered and the service and day closed with hundreds leaving the Tabernacle singing "I'll Go Where You Want To Go."

The reports and messages of the day, in services marked by the manifest presence of the Holy Spirit, gave us confidence that this will be a great year in our missionary work here in the homeland, and across the seas?

THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY AUXILIARY

On the recommendation of the Alliance, a Women's Missionary Auxiliary of the Reformed Baptist Church was organized at Beulah this year. The duties of this denominational organization are defined as follows:

(1 To promote the organization and activity of local auxiliaries which shall function in conjunction with the

local Missionary Society.

(2 To encourage in the local auxiliary such activities as preparing and sending clothing, hospital supplies, and other needed items to missionaries on the field.

(3 To give direction and Leadership in co-operation with the Foreign Mission Board, to special projects which would involve the local auxiliary in financial responsibility.

Officers of the newly formed W. M. A., nominated by the Foreign Mission Board, and elected by the Alliance for a three-year term are:

The purpose of this new organization is to inform local auxiliaries of the needs of the field, to present special prayer requests, and to provide counsel, under the direction of the Foreign Mission Board, in respect to projects sponsored by the local auxiliary involving financial responsibility.

MORGANS AT BLACK'S HARBOUR

Rev. and Mrs. William Morgan, Bill and Elsie to most of our people, will serve the Black's Harbour church during this church year. This arrangement has been made after consultation with and the approval of the Foreign Mission Board. The Morgans feel that pastoral experience in the homeland is essential to the best service on the mission field, and chiefly for this reason requested approval of their spending some time in pastoral work. They will be spending the month of October visiting some of our churches and will endeavour to arrange for missionary meetings and conventions with our churches. A cable received during the Beulah Camp, from the Superintendent of our Foreign missionary work contained the good news: "Rosamond Dow church in Rhodesia completed. Work progressing on Demercent Memorial Church at Mesoboteheni".

The Foreign Mission Board cabled to Brother Kierstead approval of a plan to purchase materials for the construction of hospital and dwelling for Dr. and Mrs. Storer Emmett, of Old Town, Maine, who are under appointment to sail for Rhodesia in 1960. Dr. Emmett, graduate of Johns Hopkins University's Class of 1958 is now interning at the Eastern Maine General Hospital, Bangor, Maine, while his wife, Wilma, is working on her Master's Degree in Education at the University of Maine Preparations for sending the Emmetts to the field, and particularly for construction of the dwelling and hospital, purchase of medical and hospital equipment, etc., is a major project of our foreign missionary endeavour for the next two years.
