Bethany Board and Alliance Executive were authorized to function as a joint committee in investigating possibilities of selling the Yarmouth property, and developing plans for relocating and building at a place more central to our denominational constituency, "choice of location and plans for building subject to the approval of the Alliance. Subsequent action by the Alliance, on the recommendation of this joint committee, designated \$10,000 of "available funds" as a "Bethany Building Fund".

Licensed to preach the Gospel were Dr. Storer Emmett, of Old Town, Maine; Miss Sheila Graham, of Maple Ridge, N. B.; and Stafford Hutchison of Salem, N. B.

Approval was given to a plan to build a Children's Tabernacle at Beulah Camp, especially for the work of the Daily Vacation Bible School. Revs. F. A. Dunlop and Jack Stevens are a committee working on plans for this building and it is hoped that it will be ready for next year's Camp. An offering of more than \$90.00 was given to start a fund at the close of this year's D. V. B. S. programme. Any desiring further information may write Rev. Jack Stevens, Norton, N. B.

The "Wharf Cottage", remembered by those who have attended Beulah Camp for more than twenty years as "The Store Cottage", was sold to Mr. Oscar Heywood, of Victoria, N. B., father of our missionary Eric Heywood.

Much important business was transacted this year. There was a splendid spirit of co-operation throughout. Our Superintendent, Rev. F. A. Dunlop, rendered very fine service as chairman of the meetings of the Session, with the Secretary, Rev. H. R. Ingersoll, performing his duties faithfully and efficiently.

And so, lacking the necessity of a special Session, the Alliance stands adjourned until July 1, 1959. Our grateful thanks to God for His gracious presence in the meetings of this year's Session, and a prayer that, through His providential mercy, we may meet "at the time and place", next year!
