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passion of Christ. In the assaulted Jew who fell among thieves, we see a bruised and bleeding world stripped of its robes of righteousness, robbed of all that is of value and left to die. The priest passes by in absolute indifference to the need and the curious Levite looks on but neither have enough concern to help the man. Too often, this is the attitude of the church. The Word says, "But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was: and when he saw him, he had compassion on him." He was so moved by this man's condition that he "went to him, and bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine, and set him on his own beast, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him." This is not just a lesson in social service, as some would have us believe but it is a revelation of the heart of Jesus Christ toward the bruised and fallen. Here, He gives a rebuke to the cold formalism of a heartless orthodoxy.

It is time that the church examine herself with regard to her soul passion or concern for the lost. When the church gets more concerned about saving the lost, the lost will get more concern about getting saved. There are as many anxious sinners as there are anxious saints!

We need to feel with the apostle Paul, as he said, "I have great heaviness and continual sorrow in my heart . . . for my brethren according to the flesh" (Rom. 9:2, 3).

David Brainerd once said, "I care not where I go or how I live or what I endure so that I may save souls.

When I sleep, I dream of them; when I awake, they are first in my thoughts... No amount of scolastic attainment, of able and profound exposition, of brilliant and stirring eloquence can atone for the absence of a deep, impassioned sympathetic love for human souls."

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In Ezekiel 9:4 we hear God speaking to the man with the inkhorn in his hand and saying, "Go through the midst of the city... and set a mark upon the foreheads of the men that sigh and cry for all the abominations that be done in the midst thereof." Should God take the same course today, how many would receive the mark? One has stated recently that "America stands at the crossroads of destiny, faced with an unavoidable choice—the mark of the man with the inkhorn or the mark of the beast. It must be revival through a people upon their faces before God, or it will be antichrist."

A passion for souls that will rob us of ease and drive us to our knees is the greatest need of the hour.

There must come to the church a REVIVAL OF SINCERE PRAYING. From her very beginning the church has conquered through prayer and she will continue to triumph only as she prays. Christ said "men ought always to pray and not to faint." The place of prayer is the real field of battle, and to win here will mean victory, but to faint will mean defeat. As we read the New Testament record, we conclude the thing that taxed the energy of the Saviour most was the work of prayer; having won here all else seemed to be done with ease.
