

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S TABERNACLE

I have felt for sometime a report was due on the Children's Tabernacle project. The following is a report to date.

Shortly after Beulah Camp a letter was written to the St. John Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church of Canada requesting permission to move their vacated church at Westfield to Beulah to be used for the Children's tabernacle. After their board met in September the request was granted.

Due to highway regulations the building, 51 x 31, had to be taken down and moved by truck. The material we were able to salvage would have cost \$5000. The building will be put up the same size as it was before.

The lot at Beulah in the grove near "Jacob's Well" has been cleared and gravelled. By the time you read this report, we hope to have completed moving the building to the new site.

As treasurer of the Tabernacle Fund, I have received nearly \$700.00 from our tabernacle dollar drive and expect to hear from a number of churches yet. If your church hasn't taken part, it isn't too late to do so. We will need your help in order to reach our objective of \$1500. by the end of the church year.

If funds permit, we would like to put a full basement under the building.

I would like to commend the Crusaders for their fine efforts and urge them on to their objective.
